RICHMOND'S MYSTERY. MACHINIST SHOT AT SAME TIME J. T. O'BRIEN WAS KILLED.

O'Brien at the Richmond locomotive works, on Saturday morning, became intensified today, when it developed that hardly a minute before he was shot through the heart, Manny Parker, one of his machinists, who was standing about fifteen feet behind him, was shot in the back of the head, Parker is at his home. It seems marvelous that both men were not killed.

JUMPED FROM A STEAMER. SUICIDE OF AN UNKNOWN MAN ABOUT FORTY-FIVE YEARS OLD.

CLEVELAND, O., Oct. 14.—A well-dressed man, about forty-five years of age, jumped overboard from the vessel which was en route from Buffalo to Cleveland. The steamer was stopped and a diligent search made for the man, but he could not be found.

MURDERED AND ROBBERED. CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—Charles Crockett, thirty-seven years old, died in Providence Hospital under circumstances that lead the police to believe he was murdered. In company with others, it is said, he spent several hours gambling and left for home with his winnings. He was found on a street unconscious, and died without being able to tell who were his assailants.

SUICIDE OF AN OLD SOLDIER. KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 14.—Thomas Gleason, of Taylor, Tex., died here today as the result of a bullet wound, it is believed, intended by a Civil War veteran and Leavenworth, Mo. His discharge was in the name of Company F, Tenth Kentucky Infantry.

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WORK OF BURGLARS. Safe Wrecked and Building Burned, but No Money Secured.

BLUFFTON, O., Oct. 14.—Burglars early today blew open the safe in the office of the Bluffton Milling Company here, with a large charge of dynamite. The building caught fire and the entire plant was destroyed, causing a loss of \$25,000.

Frightened by Villagers. PINCONNING, Mich., Oct. 14.—The Farmers' Bank of this village, was attacked by a party of five burglars early today. The outside door was blown off and the burglars secured nothing, as the safe was empty. They fired two shots at Night Operator Greet, who attempted to turn in a fire alarm, and made their escape.

AN EXCHANGE OF SHOTS. FURTHER FIGHTING BETWEEN STRIKERS AND MINE GUARDS.

Trouble in Hopkins and Webster Counties—Effort to Settle Scranton's Strike.

HOPKINSVILLE, Ky., Oct. 14.—Two hundred shots were exchanged Saturday night between the county posse acting as mine guards at the Empire Company's tipple in North Christian, and an unknown attacking party, supposed to be union miners. Thirty guards who had taken shelter in the engine house from rain were fired on through the windows. The fight was kept up in darkness till morning, but none of the posse was wounded.

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
