Not a single sporting writer or devotee of the ring, diamond, turf or other sporting lines, did not feel with deep sorrow the passing away of Harry Weldon last week.

Pat Powers's organization has decided to impose a fine of \$1,000 on players who ignore the reserve clause and sign contracts with the American Association.

Leaving all other questions that are just outside the argument, the \$1,000 fine is the most serious penalty that will be adopted by the Association of Minor Leagues.

In making this rule the minor leagues hoped to frighten ball players and prevent them from signing with American Association clubs, where they could get larger salaries.

Powers and his colleagues fear the American Association, as it is a formidable rival, and one that will prove the best organization outside the National and American leagues.

The minor leagues have cast aside the salary limit in addition to adding the \$1,000 fine clause. It is an outrage against ball players and the best thinking ones will be more influenced than ever to accept terms from the American Association.

When the American League adopted its policy of expansion and broke away from the national agreement ball players received larger salaries. That American League was declared an outlaw, but that did not hinder the players from signing salaries with Johnson's league.

Neither will the fact that the American Association has been declared an outlaw by Powers et al prevent players from flocking to Hickey's organization. The players realize better than any one else that war between leagues means fighting.

They will go where the money is. They realize further that an organization composed of large cities can afford to pay larger salaries than one composed of small cities. They will go where the money is.
