From the positions of the bodies the miners were evidently eating their lunches when the explosion occurred. They were seated in groups of five and ten, with their buckets and the remains of their lunches scattered about the floor. Evidently their lives were snuffed quickly and easily.

As to the direct cause of the explosion I cannot exactly say. We know there was an explosion of fire damp in the sixth right heading of the section commonly known as the Klondike. There are, so far as I can find out now, more than three hundred deaths from the explosion itself. The rest were caused by the after-damp.

Coronation Date Fixed for Between Aug. 8 and Aug. 12, and is Expected to Be Saturday, Aug. 9.

Trouble Over the Oath of Allegiance—Suicide Caused by Riches—Other Old World News.

LONDON, July 11.—The following authorized statement was issued this evening: "The King has made such excellent progress that his medical advisers believe His Majesty is now strong enough to be moved from London."

It was officially stated today that the coronation of King Edward will take place on Monday, Aug. 12.

It is now considered practically certain, in view of this announcement, that King Edward will be crowned on Saturday, Aug. 9.

It is understood that the general outline of the programme of the procession to Westminster Abbey, the route to be followed, etc., will not be changed, but the programme will be settled by the King himself.

It is expected that the coronation will be a most magnificent affair, and that the King's health and the weather justify a cruise, when, as on the occasion of the injury to the King, the coronation will be held at Plymouth and lay off the Earl of Mount Edgumbe's beautiful estate.
