Chairman Masters of the Prohibition State committee, said last night that he was highly pleased with the results of the election so far as learned. The indications were that the party is growing in the State and the gains reported in this and other counties, Mr. Masters thinks, is a hopeful sign for the party. The election of yesterday was the first general election in which the party was permitted to have watchers in the voting places during the count. At all of the precincts to which watchers were called they were welcomed by the old party men and invited to help in the count. Only one watcher was disputed entrance to the voting place and this was in the sixth precinct of the Fourth ward, it is said.

**SPENCER IS HOPEFUL.**  
Democratic County Chairman Still Claims a Victory.  
Chairman W. W. Spencer, of the Democratic county committee, refused to concede the Republican victory in the county at 1 o'clock this morning. Instead, Mr. Spencer insisted that the Democrats had achieved a victory and elected the entire ticket by pluralities varying from 600 to 1,900. The returns furnished the county committee indicate to Mr. Spencer that the Democrats gained in some precincts had been large and with these gains as a basis for calculation it was figured that the ticket had been elected. In some precincts the Democratic committee reported losses on the Republican books and great gains in their own vote.

The individual candidates on the county ticket who were said to be running ahead of the ticket were August Kuhn, Jacob Woessner and Charles Clark. These men were running well, Mr. Spencer said, and he is sure that when a final count is made Kuhn will certainly be elected.

**TALK WITH THE MAYOR.**  
He Expresses Satisfaction at the Result of the Election.  
When information reached Mayor Bookwalter that the Republican county ticket had been successful by pluralities ranging from 600 to 700 for Ensley to 1,800 or 2,000 for the rest of the county ticket and a probable plurality for Overstreet of 3,500 he expressed his gratification by the following:  
"I am more than gratified because I recognize the fact that the entire force of the Democratic fight was concentrated against Ensley. Without speaking disparagingly of the other candidates on the Republican ticket, Mr. Ensley is one of the best of the younger element of Republicans. I know that during the last ten days of the election Kuhn spent a vast sum of money, and the Democratic committee were given explicit instructions to defeat Ensley by any means in their power."  
"I recognize the fact that a great many Republicans voted against Ensley, and I consider his election as a most notable victory. This campaign has seemed as if the city administration were on trial, and although I do not take any credit for the victory, I realize that a victory for the county ticket is a victory for the city administration, since we supplied in a great measure the sinews of war and the energy with which it was conducted."  
"I have known Mr. Ensley from boyhood and have a full knowledge of his ability and of his absolute integrity. A victory for him gives me a sense of personal exultation."  
"I am a good Republican with a full adherence in the will of my party, and a victory under any circumstances cannot be as mightily pleasing to me."

**CROWDS NOT NOISY.**

**However, the People Were Anxious to Get the Returns.**

The streets were free from election night noises last night, but as crowded and animated as on the nights of general elections. As early as 8 o'clock crowds congregated in front of the newspaper offices, at the theaters, hotels, committee rooms and other centers of news from election returns and waited patiently for the first bulletins of the result. Nothing of interest to the many people and no bulletins sufficiently definite to hold their attention were received before 9 o'clock and the crowd was shifting about from one newspaper office to another and always idly sauntering up and down the streets.

Many women were on the streets accompanied by escorts and some of them alone and all seemed as keenly interested in the results of the elections held all over the United States as the men. No horns or rattles or other instruments giving out unseemly noises were seen and attempts at boisterous conduct were checked by the police, who were stationed at many points along the streets to keep order. Young people were in the majority in the thronging throngs that only stopped in front of screens on which early returns were thrown long enough to read the bulletins and pass on to search for something more exciting. Older men stood in front of the bulletin boards and patiently awaited something on which they could base an opinion as to the result of the elections. The elections in New York and Pennsylvania were interesting to the crowd and returns from those places served to keep the attention engaged until news from Indiana and Marion county could be published.

At all of the theaters election returns were read from the stages and large crowds were present at the performances to see the plays and hear the returns. In many of the down town saloons men were gathered, drawn there by the election betting and bets were often taken and ever changing. Bets on all propositions from majorities down to the number of votes polled and received by individual candidates were posted at many of the places.

In the committee rooms of the two parties the usual crowds of precinct workers and candidates were gathered. Stories of political contests of other days were discussed with bad cigars, except at times when telephonic messages announced the results of votes in county or city precincts were read.

Davis, for senator, will lose this county by 300. Miers, for Congress, probably has carried Monroe, and Wellens (Dem.) has been elected to the Legislature.  
Judge Miers says he is re-elected to Congress by 1,500 plurality over Judge Chaney. He expects to carry every county in the district except Lawrence.

**Sullivan County.**

SULLIVAN, Ind., Nov. 4.—Twelve precincts in Sullivan county give Schoonover 1,135, Storms 884, a net Republican gain of 451, a gain of over thirty-five to the precinct. Four precincts in Sullivan county give Miers, for Congress, 303, Chaney 274. The same precincts in 1900 gave Storms 490, Chaney 250, a net Republican gain of 153. Six precincts show a net Republican gain of 197. Miers' majority in Sullivan county will fall below 700. Indications are that Samuel O. Self, Republican candidate for recorder, will be elected over W. W. Hunt by a small plurality. The normal Democratic majority will be less than one-half, and some Democratic county candidates will be elected by a majority of about one-third the usual amount. Today's election saw the greatest inroads ever made by the Republicans.
