

RELEASE OF THE GHOULS

SEVEN MEN WHO HAVE BEEN IN JAIL EIGHT MONTHS ARE FREE.

Reason Advanced by Judge Alford for His Action—Other News of the Local Courts.

Seven of the ghouls who were under indictment for their connection with the grave-robbing scandal were released on their own recognizance yesterday morning by Judge Alford. The cases have been on the Criminal Court docket for about eight months and Judge Alford said the expense to the county was too great to feed them longer.

The men set free are Walter Daniels, Al Hunt, John McEndree, Walter Williams, Garfield Buckner, William McElroy, all charged with taking and concealing a body for the purpose of dissection, and George Mason charged with disturbing a grave. With the exception of McEndree and Mason, all of the men are negroes.

While the cases against the men have not been dismissed, it is not likely they will ever be brought to trial, as the evidence against them is not strong enough to secure conviction, being simply the uncorroborated confession of Rufus Cantrell.

When the men left the courtroom yesterday they stood on the steps of the courthouse undecided just what to do. Finally the negroes started north on Delaware street. McEndree and Mason followed closely. Cantrell left last night for Atlantic City, his home.

The indictments against the doctors who were implicated in the ghoul scandals still stand, and the bonds will continue in the hands of the sheriff until three terms of court have passed, when they will expire.

In addition to the seven ghouls who were released yesterday five have been convicted. Rufus Cantrell received a sentence of three to four years, Sam Martin got three to ten, and Sol Grady, Isom Donnan and James H. Hays each received a sentence of one to three years.

Oliver Sanders, who was implicated in the murder of Doc Lane, was found guilty of manslaughter, and was sentenced to the penitentiary for one year.

Every effort was made by Prosecutor Hinkle and his assistants to convict the ghoul doctors, as well as the white doctors implicated in the matter. No one doubts this, as the evidence against them was overwhelming.

Arthur Simpson Trial. Peculiar Set of Facts Will Be Outlined by the Defense.

In the Criminal Court the trial of Arthur Simpson, formerly bookkeeper for Warman, Black, Chamberlain & Co., charged with forgery, is taking more time than was expected. The attorneys in the case were anxious for the judge to adjourn at noon, but the court has been adjourned over.

At the conclusion of the examination of Edward F. Heston, an expert accountant, yesterday morning, the state rested its case. In the afternoon the defendant took the stand and admitted to copying the alleged forged drafts by the expert who had gone over his books.

His testimony was concluded at 4 o'clock. The defense will claim that the alleged forged drafts were drawn on the account of the defendant, and that the defendant used none of the firm's money.

The trial is not expected to take much longer.

STATE AUDITOR SUES. State Auditor Sherrick has filed suit in the Superior Court against Armin C. Koehne, treasurer of Marion county, to determine the power of the County Commissioners to bind the State to pay its share of the fees of tax farmers employed to discover neglected taxes.

Mr. Koehne is recovering \$788.89, the amount Mr. Sherrick deducted from the State taxes on the account of the county. The State should pay its part of the fees of the tax farmers who recently examined the county books.

The suit is a friendly one and is merely to determine what the County Commissioners have the right to contract against the State's funds. Deputy Hadley, of the auditor's general office, prepared the complaint.

Martha A. Ferguson's Suit. Martha A. Ferguson filed suit yesterday against the Indianapolis Traction and Terminal Company for damages to the sum of \$1,500. The complaint states that she was injured on May 25 at Washington and Pennsylvania streets because a car from which she was alighting started before she reached the ground. She declared that she received injuries to her head, back and limbs in addition to the expense of medical treatment.
