MURDERER CONFESSES.

CHICAGO, Sept. 19.—Louis Penant, who was arrested today on the charge of murdering Mrs. Mary Spilka, forty-nine years old, in a dark garret at her home last night, confessed the crime to the police this afternoon. The crime was committed for money, \$250 having been secured by the murderer. At first he tried to implicate another man, Penant's confession, according to the police, is as follows:

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RICHARDS EXONERATED

BUT THE REPORT OF THE GRISBY CASE NOT MADE PUBLIC.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—The Department of Justice has received preliminary reports from its examiners who went to Alaska to investigate charges against Melvin Richards, the United States attorney, Frank H. Richards, the United States marshal, and Capt. W. H. Richards, district marshal. Richards was charged with attempting to influence the grand jury and with irregularities in the receipt of benefits from the renting of the jail at Nome. District Attorney Grisby is charged with a number of irregularities in the conduct of his office. Marshal Richards is exonerated of all the charges made against him. In this case, District Attorney Grisby, who was the colonel of a regiment organized in the Northwest during the Spanish war, the department of justice declines to make public the contents of the report. Final reports are expected to be made in both of these cases within the next few weeks.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—The monthly statement of the collections of internal revenue shows for the month of August the receipts were \$18,754,414, an increase as compared with August, 1902, of \$1,041,886. The receipts from the several sources of revenue are given as follows: Spirits, \$4,471,561, an increase of \$478,700; tobacco, \$2,438,000, an increase of \$100,000; distilled spirits, \$4,711,667, a decrease of \$100,123; oleomargarine, \$3,233,231, a decrease of \$1,121,000; and other sources, \$4,110,000, an increase of \$22,000. The total receipts for August were \$33,555,000, an increase of \$1,000,000 over the corresponding month last year.
