

FITZ GOES DECISIVE

UNABLE TO KNOCK GARDNER OUT AND FIGHT WENT LIMIT.

Several Times Fitz Apparently Had Gardner Almost Out, but He Lacked His Old Strength.

GARDNER NOT IN FITZ'S CLASS

DEMONSTRATED THAT HE DID NOT HAVE A HARD PUNCH IN HIM.

Fitz Claimed He Broke Knuckles of Both His Hands Early in the Contest—The Fight by Rounds.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 25.—Bob Fitzsimmons proved to-night that he was not a "dead one" when he boxed and outgeneralized George Gardner for twenty full rounds. Fitz was awkward and as cunning as a young fox, apparently realizing that he must foster his strength, there was not a moment when he was not carefulness personified.

Referee Eddie Grady, at the close of the contest, said that he had never seen a fight like this before. He was forced to give the decision to Fitz because the latter scored the knockdowns, but otherwise did no damage. It was apparent that neither man was qualified to claim championship honors.

After the fight Fitz appeared to be overjoyed at his victory, and dodging Gardner's blows and in the clinches and break-aways was very careful. The fight did not please the spectators and the men in the ring were frequently hissed when they went through a round without apparently trying to fight.

FITZ STAGGERED GARDNER. Round 11—Fitz caught Gardner with a right on the stomach, and then hooked him viciously with a left on wind. Fitz fought hard, but Gardner blocked him. Gardner's punches seemed to lack force.

FIGHT BY ROUNDS. Detailed Description Shows that Gardner Was Floored Often. Both men weighed close to 128 pounds, though Gardner was a bit the heavier.

Round 1—They went to the center quickly and immediately began to circle. Gardner danced around lively and ducked a vicious left for the jaw. They came together with a right on the jaw and a hard right on the stomach.

Round 2—After considerable sparring both missed lefts for the body. Fitz got in a light to the head and Gardner with his right. Gardner then drove his right twice to the body and once to the head.

GARDNER GROGGY IN FOURTH. Round 4—Fitz swung his right to the jaw and they mixed it, Bob ducking and blocking cleverly. Fitz stood back and then tried left and right for the jaw, but was blocked.

Round 10—Fitz missed a fierce right hook for the head and Gardner was wild with a right swing to the body.

Round 11—Fitz caught Gardner with a right on the stomach, and then hooked him viciously with a left on wind.
