HUGE POLITIC STONE DEAL IS COMPLETED

Perry, Matthews & Buskirk Sell Their Quarry to Cleveland Stone Company for \$600,000.

DIVIDEND ALSO IS PAID

Special to the Indianapolis Journal. BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Dec. 28.—The \$600,000 sale by the Perry, Matthews & Buskirk Quarry Company, between Harrodsburg and Bedford, becomes the property of the Cleveland Stone Company, was closed to-day.

The quarry is the largest ever made in the colitic stone belt. In addition to the \$600,000 for the plant a 10 per cent dividend, or \$60,000, was paid for the year just ended to the old stockholders.

TRACTION RAILROAD DESIRES A SUBSIDY

People of Columbus Want the Road Built, but Do Not Intend to Pay for Building It.

The same road asked a subsidy from Jackson township, in Jackson county, and the people of that township decided to stand against it. They held public meetings, denouncing the action of the directors, and after feeling had grown so strong against the subsidy the directors of the road recanted.

WANTS TO BURGLE, BUT LACKS BURGLAR'S TOOLS

Frank Admission by Thomas Keefe, a Notorious Crook, Who Is Now in Indianapolis Jail.

HIS CRIMINAL RECORD

Special to the Indianapolis Journal. TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Dec. 28.—"Is the burglar who wants to burgle but cannot because he lacks the tools of his craft, a character dangerous enough to warrant his confinement in jail?"

This is a question the police authorities of several cities in Indiana and Illinois are asking in regard to the case of Thomas Keefe, a well-known crook, who has served time for violations of the criminal statutes and who is now held at Indianapolis on the charge of being a common thief.

The police feel that if Keefe remains at liberty he may burgle a "jimmy" and then proceed to burgle a store or residence. Therefore he is being watched. If he could be found in possession of a burglar's outfit he might be sent to the penitentiary, even if he had not used the tools, but as long as he has not the "kit" he is regarded as nothing more than a suspicious character.

REAR-END COLLISION ON A COAL RAILROAD

Engineer Prescott, of First Section, Killed, and Engineer Bond, Second Section, Hurt.

BOTH OF DANVILLE, ILL.

NEWPORT, Ind., Dec. 28.—A rear-end collision of two freight trains on the Chicago & Indiana Coal Railroad at West Union, three miles east of here, at 8 o'clock last night resulted in the death of Engineer G.
