Lennon Withdraws Opposition and Becomes Chairman Board of Directors—Pennant Awarded to St. Paul—Schedule Committee to Meet Next Month—Indianapolis Players.

Staff Correspondence of the Journal. CHICAGO, Dec. 28.—J. Ed. Grillo, sporting editor of the Cincinnati Commercial Tribune, was today elected president of the American Baseball Association. His election had been contemplated by the majority of the organization, and the election was announced unanimously.
