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COL. EDWARD BUTLER IS ACCQUITTED OF BRIBERY

Millionaire Is Declared Not Guilty of "Influencing" Nineteen Aldermen.

MR. FOLK IS SURPRISED

FULTON, Mo., Feb. 6.—The jury in the case of Col. Edward Butler, the millionaire St. Louis politician on trial on the charge of bribing nineteen members of the House of Delegates at St. Louis, returned a verdict at 10 o'clock a. m. which read: "We, the jury, find the defendant not guilty."

When the verdict was read a dozen of Col. Butler's friends gave forth a wild shout and dashed into the street to spread the news. Butler stepped quickly from his place and shook hands with Foreman Rosser and the jurors. Judge Graves then discharged the jury.

Circuit Attorney Folk appeared dumfounded. "I thought the state presented a good case," he said; "beyond that I have nothing to say now."

About eighteen ballots were taken, according to Foreman Rosser, and at the start the jury stood ten for acquittal, two for conviction. "One of those voting to acquit changed after the first ballot," said Foreman Rosser. "The other men held their vote stubbornly until 9:30 this morning, when they finally came into line."

DUKE OF ARGVLL CALLS LORD SPENCER UNJUST. Writes a Letter on Canada's Colonial Preference Given to the Mother Country. LONDON, Feb. 6.—The Duke of Argyll, in a letter to the Times, declares that Lord Spencer is unjust to the colonial preference given the motherland. Lord Spencer does not understand the necessity felt by a colony to foster its territories. Manufacturers were bred in Britain also under a tariff. Canada, New Zealand, Australia have all pressing forward in the lines of the duke's argument.

RUSSIAN PAPER SAYS WE ARE RESPONSIBLE. Novoe Vremya Blames the United States for Present Troubles in the Far East. ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 6.—The anti-American feeling, which was considerably intensified by the appointment of consuls in Manchuria, does not abate. The Novoe Vremya bitterly declares that war is being brought on, not by any Russian greed for territory, but by the antagonism of the United States to the colonial preference given the motherland.

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Korea the Real Bone of Contention Between Russians and Japanese

(CONCLUDED FROM PAGE 1, PART 2.) Chinese Manchuria. The coveting of Liaotung was therefore a fine diplomatic move, but unfortunately for Japan, her plan miscarried. Liaotung she reckoned will be able to her in Korea north and south, and, as a consequence, that empire will have to say "Amien" to every power.

THE WATERWAYS IN DETAIL. There are first, on the north, the Narrows, between the Siberian continent and Sachalin, which constitutes a shallow, dangerous waterway. Nikolaevsk is situated on the Narrows, terminating in the Sea of Ochotski, a turn-around alley without outlet except through the Kurile Islands, extending from the southern extremity of Kamchatka to Yezo. The Kuriles passed under Japanese sovereignty, by treaty with Russia, in 1875.

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
