

# Happenings on the Links, Athletic Field and Race Track

## GOLFERS ON THE LINKS

First Practice Rounds at Riverside, Country Club and Highland Club.

## ARRANGE BIG TOURNEYS

Important Matches Will Be Played This Season on the Various Links.

The bright, balmy air of yesterday and the welcome sunshine seemed to arouse a love of the game of golf in the hearts of the Indianapolis enthusiasts that had been dormant during the long winter months. The links of the Country Club, Riverside and Highland clubs, while not in the best condition owing to the recent rains and floods, were thronged with players who, in their eagerness to take full advantage of the first opportunity to make the rounds, played with a vim that insured many lame muscles-to-day.

At the Country Club many of the older members, augmented by new devotees of the game, were in force and the cadres had their first busy day since last fall, when the finals in the state championship were played. The links of the Country Club are probably in better shape than the other local greens. The Country Club grounds were hardly flooded by recent high waters, and for this reason the work of getting the links in proper shape for playing will not incur the labor that was necessary at Riverside.

Many of the most prominent golfers of the state will meet in an open tournament which will be held on the Country Club links this summer and fall. The formal opening of the links will take place on Monday, May 20, when an eighteen-hole handicap sweepstakes match will be played. Saturday, June 15, has been left open for team matches and on July 4 the handicap handicap eighteen-hole competition will be played. Aug. 4 is an open date for team matches and the women's ball handicap event will be played. The preliminary round of the club championship will be played on Sept. 24 and the finals will be played Oct. 22.

The Riverside and Highland clubs will also witness important matches this season. Tournaments are now being arranged with out-of-town teams, and the members of the two clubs will doubtless give good accounts of themselves in the play. The formal opening of the Riverside and Highland links will take place on or about May 30. Those of the Riverside Club who played the first rounds of the links yesterday were Messrs. Reible, Barrows, Rehn, Clark, Patterson, Robinson, Judge Ayers, Minor, Sharp, Parry, Arnold, Woodbury and Mrs. Woodbury. The women also played: Mesdames Hammond, Judson and Henderson and Misses Rallsback, Jeffries and Mayes. Policeman Sandy, who has charge of the season tickets at Riverside, reported that he had sold fifteen on that day alone and that the interest shown by the golfers this year far exceeded any past season.

## To Fool Deadheads

The management of the New York Polo grounds has devised a new kind of screen this year to prevent the hundreds of rail birds on the One-hundred-and-fifty-fifth street viaduct from seeing the game without paying. In place of the old canvas stretchers stretched across the viaduct and bleachers, they have built a large screen of slats or laths, placed a quarter of an inch apart. The thing is built on the same principle as the sides of the rack of a ferry slip, so that it will sway and give a slight wind without being blown down.

## INDIANA'S ATHLETES BESTED NOTRE DAME

Bloomington Track Men Won Dual Meet by a Margin of Forty Points.

## SHIDELER WAS A STAR

Special to the Indianapolis Journal. BLOOMINGTON, Ind., April 30.—Indiana's fleet athletes easily won the dual track and field meet from Notre Dame here this afternoon, scoring 76 to 26. Draper, of Notre Dame, was the star attraction and nearly the whole team for the visitors, capturing two firsts and three seconds, making nineteen points. Indiana carried four events clear and won eleven out of fourteen firsts. "Tad" Shideler, the freshman crack field athlete, made the best showing for the varsity, taking three firsts and one second, in all scoring eighteen points, which record was only surpassed by but one point by Draper, of Notre Dame.

Martin, Indiana's sprinter, took second place, with a total of fifteen points. No records were broken, though in the hurdles and the dash the state record was reached within a fraction of a second.
