In plans. In round figures the canal will cost \$200,000,000 and will require ten years to complete. Aside from the masonry, machinery and other skilled labor, the constructive work will give employment to 50,000 men.

John Findley Wallace was born at Fall River, Mass., and educated at civil engineering at Monmouth University, Monmouth, N. J., where he received his degree in 1870. He was assistant engineer on surveys for the Quincy, Alton & St. Louis Railroad.

Jan. 1, 1881, Mr. Wallace was employed by the Illinois Central as chief engineer of the world's first transportation problem and to submit plans for taking care of this business and the other business of the Illinois Central.

Mr. Wallace was appointed assistant second vice president of the Illinois Central and was in charge of the engineering department he was called upon to assist the second vice president in the construction of matters connected with the operation of the road.

On Jan. 1, 1891, Mr. Wallace's title was changed to assistant vice president and he was placed at the head of the operating department, having in charge the engineering, roadwork, construction, machinery and other departments classed under the head of operation.

Mr. Wallace is also chairman of the advisory board of joint track elevation in the city of Chicago and has been in charge of the Chicago and Rock Island, Chicago and Alton and Chicago and St. Louis lines.

FRAUD ORDERS PROBED

WASHINGTON, May 10.—Testimony in regard to the Barrett-Nelms partnership announcements was given again today by A. Smith Bowman, secretary and treasurer of the Southern Mutual Investment Company, of Lexington, Ky., at the trial of James N. Tyner and Harrison J. Barrett on charges of conspiracy.

For the first time since the trial opened, General Tyner was not in court today. It did not appear from his testimony who sent the announcements to the company, Mr. Nelms or Mr. Barrett.

George Ott, secretary of the Mutual Weekly Investment Company, of Lexington, Ky., said he had been employed by Barrett and Nelms as his attorney, and in an attorney. Shortly thereafter a fraud order was issued against the company.

M. G. Watson, formerly secretary of the Colonial Investment Company, of Cincinnati, Ohio, said he had received a copy of the Barrett opinion and one of the Barrett-Nelms announcement cards.

Elmer J. Miller, formerly a member of the Board of Directors of the Ohio Department Company, of Columbus, O., told of receiving a copy of the Barrett opinion and an announcement card from the latter was mailed from Washington, and was identical with a copy of the Barrett opinion which was shown to him.

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HOOLEY UNDER AGONY IS HELD IN CONSPIRACY CHARGE

Englishman Whose Schemes Once Started Financial World, Is Accused of Fraud.

LAWSON ALSO ARRESTED

LONDON, May 10.—Ernest T. Hookey, whose meteoric career and company promoting a few years ago astonished the financial world, was arrested in London today on the charge of conspiracy to defraud.

Hookey and Lawson were subsequently brought up at Bow-street Police Court, Counsel for the prosecution, which is undertaken by the public prosecutor, said the prisoners were charged with defrauding A. J. Prime of £20,000 by selling him shares of Siberian gold mines and other worthless concerns.

A receiving order in bankruptcy was issued against Ernest Terah Hookey June 8, 1888. Hookey at that time was employed by Lawson, another company promoter, who was prominently interested in bicycle, land and other schemes.

THE platform adopted by the convention was a strong endorsement of the Republican national and state administrations and indirectly favors the nomination of President Roosevelt to succeed himself.

YATES COMBINATION TO ORGANIZE CONVENTION

CONGRESSMAN CANNON WILL PRESEDE OVER THE ILLINOIS REPUBLICAN MEETING TO-DAY. SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 10.—The developments of today clearly indicate the organization of the Illinois Republican convention, which convenes here Thursday, by the combined forces of Governor Yates, Col. Frank O. Lowden and Congressman Vespasian Warner.

The existence of the combination came to light when the state central committee met to hear the contested cases for the purpose of determining which of the contesting delegates shall sit in the temporary organization. The first test vote came on the Sangamon county case, in which the committee, by a vote of 25 to 3, decided to seat the Yates delegates as against the Hamlin delegates.
