He was killed at the Mento Park stock farm of W. O. McDonough to relieve great suffering from paralysis. Ormonde, who was foaled in 1883, the son of Ben D'O'Leary Agnes, had and owned by the Duke of Westminster, won every race that he started in and earned for his owner in stakes the sum of \$42,250. He also had the distinction of winning all three of the great events of the British turf—the Two Thousand Guineas, the Derby and the St. Leger. He was eventually sold to his late owner for \$50,000 for breeding purposes. Lord of the Dale Scratched.
