

ARRANGEMENTS MADE BY THE STATE CENTRAL COMMITTEE WITH ALL THE RAILROADS

Arrangements have been made by the State Central Committee with all the railroads running into Indianapolis, viz. the Lafayette, the Pennsylvania, the Central, the Cincinnati, the Madison, the Jeffersonville and the Terre Haute, to carry delegates to the Democratic State Convention, to be held in this city on Wednesday, the 25th day of January, 1862, at half fare rates.

Those who desire to take advantage of this arrangement can ascertain all particulars by enquiring of the agents of the different stations, and general, on each road. The Convention promises to be largely and generally attended, the most of the kind ever held in the State, and its action will doubtless have an important bearing upon public affairs, as it will speak the sentiments of the conservative people of Indiana. THE LATE FIGHT AT ALBANY

We give the following letter, published in the Logansport Express. It seems to be an impartial account by a soldier:

GREAT MOUNTAIN SCIMITZ

AMOS CHILCOTE—Dear Brother: I received yours of the 24th inst. and was glad to learn that you and to know that you were all well. I am well, but almost worn out with fatigue and exposure. We have just returned from the bloodiest battle that has been fought in this campaign. We started at 4 o'clock P. M. and marched to the Allegheny Mountains, about thirty miles distant. We reached the Green Bear camp, where we halted until 11 o'clock P. M., when we again fell into line, and proceeded on our long and tiring march. Our force consisted of 1,500 men, and our artillery.

The 2nd and two hundred of the 2d Virginia attacked them in the rear, under command of Colonel Moody and Major John Milroy. General Milroy attacked them in front, with parts of the 25th and 31st Ohio and 13th Indiana. We attacked them on Friday morning about eight o'clock. The 3rd charged on them and almost reached their breastworks. General Milroy, of Company A, who was leading the charge, fell mortally wounded. The rebels then opened fire on us so furiously that our Colonel ordered us to fall flat on our faces, which we did. He was killed, and we were ordered to retreat. Flour unchanged for superline and the demand fair; superfine sold at \$4; extra and family sold at \$3 1/2. Wheat, not higher, and closed at \$3 5/8 for red and \$2 5/8 for white. Corn firm at 27c. Oats 27 1/2c. Rye has advanced to 43c. Barley 45c. Hops firm and in good demand 13 1/2c. Beans firm and 5c higher; receipts light, only 4,000 bush in the last 24 hours; receipts closed at \$3 25 @ 40. Provisions unchanged. Mess pork \$2 25 @ 37 1/2c. Lard in better demand, and 6 1/2c is freely offered, but 5 1/2c is asked. Grease, tallow, tallow, shoulders 22 1/2c; hams 32 1/2c; ribs 34c. Lard oil is held at 72 1/2c, with an unsteady market. Bacon unchanged. Coffee unchanged. Coffee and sugar 5c higher. Molasses held 2c higher, but not much doing. Exchange 1 1/2c premium.

Flour opened firm and closed rather quiet with only a very moderate demand for export at \$5 25 @ 55 for extra; \$5 50 for superfine; \$5 75 @ 50 for common to medium extra Western; \$5 50 @ 55 for shipping brands extra good Ohio; and \$5 10 @ 75 for trade brands; market closing quiet.

Whisky a shade better; sales at 20 @ 20 1/2c. Wheat market very quiet and holders insisting on full prices, shippers are unwilling to operate largely unless at a material advance, small sales of Chicago spring at \$1 30; winter Western \$1 30; red State \$1 29; winter red Western \$1 36 @ 37; choice white Kentucky \$1 32; 3,000 bush winter low sold at \$1 35. Corn, heavy, dull and about level; sales at 6 1/2 @ 6 3/4 for mixed Western in store. Pork steady; moderate demand; sales at \$12 25 @ 12 6 1/2 for mess; \$13 for Western prime mess, and \$5 25 @ 3 for prime.

Lard in good demand but rather easier; sales at 6 @ 6 1/2c. Dressed hogs lower; sales at 14 @ 17c. Butter quiet, and prices slightly favor the buyer; we quote Ohio at 11 @ 15c, and State at 11 @ 12c. Cheese steady at 7 1/2 @ 8c, the latter an extreme price.

Coffee continues very firm, Rio 18c; Santos 22; Java 25c. Sugar—Raw is firm, and prices tend upward; Cuba \$14 @ 16c; \$14 @ 16c for Porto Rico; Havana 13c.
