McClellan's Advance.

Williamsburg, May 6.—The following is from the report of the Associated Press: The enemy evacuated this place and their works last night. Their rear guard passed through about 6 o'clock A. M. Gen. McClellan and escort entered the town and camped.

From Fort Monroe.

Fort Monroe, May 6.—The flag of truce which went up James river yesterday morning to receive released prisoners, returned today, not having accomplished their object. This is the third time General Wool has been deceived about the release of these prisoners.

From Washington.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—The Fort Monroe boat which left at 8 o'clock this morning has arrived at Cherrystone, bringing the following: Hon. E. M. Stanton, Williamsburg, May 6. He very much approves our victory more complete. The enemy's loss is great, especially in officers. I have just heard of five more of their guns being captured. Prisoners are constantly arriving. G. B. McCLELLAN.

From New York.

New York, May 7.—Yesterday afternoon a document from New York cavalry made a reconnaissance towards Harrisonburg. When five miles this side they encountered a party of 200 of Ashby's cavalry, charged upon them, and pursued them within two miles of the town. The rebels were killed and six taken prisoners. Our loss was one killed. The work on our side was done with the saber, and was a very gallant affair.

Tennessee News.

Catoosa, May 7.—A special to the Times, from the steamer Columbia, says that the rebels were captured in the recent skirmish with the rebels, who were under Clay King instead of Jeff. Thompson as at first reported. The affair occurred two miles west of Fort Heman opposite Fort Henry.

From Cincinnati.

Cincinnati, May 7.—In the United States Circuit Court, April term, 1861, the grand jury found an indictment of treason against Jas. W. Chewworth for furnishing supplies and munitions to the rebels. At the present term ex-Governor B. C. Johnson, defendant, moved to quash the indictment on the ground that the first clause of section 3, article 3, of the Constitution which provides that treason shall consist only in levying war, refers to rebellion, while the second clause, which refers to enemies in giving aid and comfort, relates only to a public war with a foreign enemy.

From Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, May 7.—The strike among the miners near Pittsville is becoming serious. The employees not complying with their demands, the miners stopped the pumps, causing serious damage to property, and the flooding of the mines. The mine of the Forest Improvement Company are rapidly filling up with water.

From New Orleans.

New Orleans, May 7.—On the 24th a flag of truce was sent to Com. Porter asking conditions for surrender. Our flag now waves over the custom house.

From San Francisco.

San Francisco, May 5.—Saidwick Island district, received the 16th of April, state that the French Consul died at Honolulu on the 29th of March.

From Baltimore.

Baltimore, May 7.—Our letter by the Old Point boat says that the mail boat Nellie Baker arrived just before the boat left, and reports that Gen. McClellan is in Williamsburg, having driven from the city by the night train, and taken the division through on the rear of Williamsburg.

From Davenport, Iowa.

Davenport, Iowa, May 7.—The grain elevator in this city, owned by Tolson & Co., of Boston, was destroyed by fire last night. Loss \$150,000. Eight thousand bushels of grain were destroyed. The grain was insured for \$700,000.

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From Mexico.

New York, May 7.—Veracruz dates of the 14th state that the French had opened hostilities and taken possession of Orizaba. The Mexicans have declared war on France. The British minister is said to be holding a private interview with Doblado at Puebla. The Mexicans have received reinforcements of 9,000 men, and the French are expected to march on the French.

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CONGRESSIONAL.

WASHINGTON, May 6.

SENATE.—Mr. Sumner offered a resolution for the expulsion of Mr. Starks, of Oregon. Mr. Kennedy presented petitions from citizens of Maryland asking for immediate and unconditional repeal of the law abolishing slavery in the District of Columbia and the better enforcement of the fugitive slave law; also a petition of W. B. Howe, asking for compensation for a slave who was appropriated to the Military service of the Government.

HOUSE.

Mr. Fessenden from the committee of Finance, reported a bill making appropriations to reimburse the Sinking Fund of the officers of the Secretary of the Treasury and for the temporary relief of 1863. Passed. Also the House bill to provide for the deficiency of payment of volunteers and for the payment of troops in the Western Department. The bill appropriates over \$20,000,000.

NEW YORK MARKET.

Flour continues heavy; prices have again declined. Wheat, with only a limited demand for export and home consumption, sales reported at \$1 55 @ 50 for choice superfine State; \$5 10 @ 50 for extra State; \$4 25 @ 50 for superfine Western; \$5 10 @ 35 for common to medium extra Western; \$5 25 @ 35 for common to good shipping brands; extra round hoop Ohio, and \$5 45 @ 50 for trade brands, market closing heavy; no buyers at outside quotations.

CINCINNATI MARKET FOR THE WEEK ENDING, MAY 7.

CATTLE.—The supply of beef cattle has been fair, but not in excess of the demand, and the market has ruled firmer, and for some small lots choice rather better rates were obtained. The demand is local and from the Government, a good many being taken to Western Virginia for the use of the army. Common at \$2 25 @ 30; fat \$2 75 @ 30; good \$3 25 @ 30; prime \$3 75 @ 30. Sheep in moderate supply and good demand at \$4 10 @ 12 per cent gross.
