From Washington.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—It is said to-night in military circles that Col. Gresham, Assistant Adjutant General of the army, upon duty in the War Department, will soon leave here for duty in the field as Chief of Staff of Major General Rosecrans, and that he will be succeeded by Col. James B. Fry, at present Chief of Staff to Gen. Bull.

The entire army has been paid to the 30th of June and a portion up to the 31st of August. The reason for non-payment as to the remainder is owing to the Treasury Department being unable to honor the requisitions of the War Department, the bounty and advance pay to the new levies having been first paid, and this transaction requiring all the available funds.

Gov. Curtin is here to confer with the President upon important military affairs connected with Pennsylvania.

Rear Admiral Dupont, in communicating to the Navy Department the circumstances attending the capture of the British steamers Scotia, Anthea, and Glouchester, and the destruction of the Manito, says the crew of the Scotia were a state of intoxication, so that they became almost unmanageable, and Acting Volunteer Lieut. Harp's New York dispatch of the 21, says no enemy opposed our advance until it reached Snickersville, when they retreated to the West-ward. As our column reached the crest of the hill, a body of rebel cavalry, a battery, and two brigades of infantry emerged from the woods in the direction of Winchester. A Parrott battery sent an effective shell amongst them, when they retreated to the woods, not again emerging. A body of rebel cavalry, which had been in the Shenandoah two miles off, afraid to retreat in the face of the battery.

Our forces are in full possession of the Gap. The rebels intend to dispute the possession of Upperville, but we are confident that they will be driven off in an hour behind time. Snickersville state that Stuart, with 3,000 rebel cavalry, passed through the Gap on Thursday.

The impression is general that a great battle will be fought to-morrow.

A dispatch to the Herald from headquarters at Wheatland, Nov. 2, P. M., contains the following: McClellan reconnoitered the enemy in front this afternoon.

General Pleasanton's cavalry, supported by a brigade of Doubleday's division, drove the rebels from the position, containing the ground with considerable fire.
