gard to Vicksburgt We give under the telegraphic head some encouraging news from Vicksburg, based upon the situation of affairs on Thursday evening last. Speaking of the investment of that stronghold, announced in the disactches of last week, the Mobile Register says, unless we have been strangely misinformed as to the strength of the place, it cannot be carried by storm The town is well garrisoned and provisoned, and the reduction of such a place by siege is a slow operation. Meanwhile, Gen. Johnston has vet to play his part in the drama. He is behind the enemy with a pretty large force, and that daily accumulate ing. From all accounts, troops are still pouring towards Jackson from the East.

Gen. Grant will have to encounter Pemberton in his forts in front, and defend himself against Jackson in his rear. It will probably require weeks or months to reduce Vicksburg. In the meanwhile, chances of war open abundant hopes of raising the siege by cutting off Grant from his supplies, or by assaulting him in his line. Richmond papers of the 26th contain nothing from Vicksburg.

Latest from Vicksburg.

Carro, May 28 - The steamer Imperial arrived at Memphis from Vicksburg Monday morn ing. From Capt Stevens, a passenger, we learn On Friday the battle was raging furiously. Grant charged the fortifications and took some of them, but the Rebels rallied and re took them. There was much hand to bread fighting. Capt. Stevens says that our loss in killed and wounded on that day will reach 5,000 . The Rebels used hand grenades when our forces attempted to storm their works. It was reported that one corps of Banks' army had arrived at Warrenton.
