The enemy attacked Ayrea' division yesterday morning and were repulsed with heavy loss. This was the only fighting yesterday on the left except on attack by Hampton's cavalry on Gregg's envalry on the Vaughn road, where they were driven back with considerable loss. Our army is strongly entrenched.

A battle may occur any moment. The enemy claims to have a number of prisoners from the 9th corps. The Richmond papers boast of a victory over Sheridan, and say he was retreating.

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
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
