The Very Latest

NEW YORK, May 18. The Times says: A gentleman of Richmond, Va., has in his possession an ingeniously contrived torpedo, made to exactly resemble a large lump of coal, which was sent to him from Richmond by his son, Everett Brig. Gen. E. H. Ripley, and found in the private cabinet of Jeff Davis after his flight from the city.

The Post editorially says it has information from trustworthy official sources that a note or dispatch in cipher was found in Booth's pocket, before it is known if it contained any information. A paper in cipher had previously been found in Jeff Davis' house in Richmond. The paper was not supposed to be of importance. The one in Booth's pocket was compared with it, and by use of it, was read.

This note proves that Davis was in communication with two of the men in Canada for whom rewards have been offered. The subject of the correspondence was the assassination which distinctly asserted that Davis favored.

The Time's special says Major General Sigel has become connected as leading publisher and editor with the Daily and Weekly Baltimore Worker, a staunch and vigorous German republican newspaper.

Mrs. Lincoln will not leave for Illinois to-morrow, as stated. She is not yet quite ready and will not depart until Monday. Her health is improving.

The Tribune's Washington special says: Within the past forty-five days thirty new districts for the collection of internal revenue have been ordered in Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee, Kentucky and Mississippi.

It is understood that Raleigh Johnson has sent for the editor of the Raleigh Standard and other prominent men of North Carolina for personal conference.

The right wing of Sherman's army under the command of Gen. Logan is not expected to arrive at Alexandria before Friday or Saturday. The headquarters of the army of the Tennessee, under charge of Captain Tappan, is established at Madison House, Alexandria, and the headquarters of the 16th corps on King street, at the same place.
