GEN. SHERIDAN'S ORDER.

Affairs in Virginia.
New York, July 11.—The Herald's correspondent, writing from Southern Virginia, represents society and industrial affairs in that region as still in a very crude condition, consequent, to a considerable extent, upon the planters and the freedmen not yet fully understanding their relations, or at least not recognizing them, and much annoyance is thereby caused to the military authorities in efforts to adjust the difficulties between the respective parties. The planters, in many instances, are disposed to insist on their authority to punish the negroes for disobedience, while numbers of the latter do not yet realize that freedom does not mean idleness, and are disposed to desert the plantations.

With regard to loyalty to the National Government of the white Virginians generally, the correspondent expresses the opinion that it is not of the genuine type. The people admit that they have been overpowered and forced to yield, but do not express regret for their rebellious cause. They still cling to the old and foolish ideas of chivalry, regarding labor as dishonorable, and cannot yet understand that a new order of things is established, under which he who would prosper must work.

Troops are still being mustered out of service in the Department of Virginia, in large numbers. Mr. Bowden, Attorney General of Virginia, under Governor Fremont, has submitted an opinion regarding who will be qualified to exercise the elective franchise at the approaching election in that State, in which he says that all adult white citizens with six months residence in a county, who have not been convicted of a crime against the Government and who are not excluded by the President's Amnesty Proclamation, may vote on the basis of the allegiance in any county of the State.

About the freedmen.
New York, July 11.—The Herald's Washington special says: A report has been reaching the Bureau of Refugees and Freedmen and Abandoned Lands on the subject of outrages committed upon negroes. The report states that prior to the dissemination of our troops through the South many slaves were hunted, shot down and left in the woods while endeavoring to reach our lines. This accounts for the outrages committed, but since a cessation of hostilities this business has stopped. There are, however, still instances of cruelty, but the majority of the people appear willing to obey the authority of the United States.

The Tribune's special says: That the Freedmen's Bureau has refused to restore to former rebels confiscated and abandoned lands set apart by the Government for the use of freedmen, and has finally concluded to leave the whole subject to the decision of the courts.

Resignation of Commissioner Dole.
WASHINGTON, July 11.—W. P. Dole, Commissioner of Indian Affairs, has resigned, and Judge J. N. Conley, of Iowa, has been appointed to the position.

The Times says: The muster out of General Wright's Provisional Corps, extinguishes the Army of the Potomac as an organization. The Army of Tennessee is also extinct. The only Corps now in existence are the Fourth, General Wood, just sent to the Department of the Gulf; the Thirtieth, General Steele, going to Texas; the Sixteenth, General A. J. Smith, in Alabama, and the Twenty Third, partitioning North Carolina, under General Gurke.

The Twenty Fourth, garrisoning Virginia, and Twenty Fifth, colored Corps, have mostly gone to Texas, under General Weitzel. These Corps are greatly reduced in numbers.

Order of General Sheridan.
New York, July 11.—The steamship Evening Star, from New Orleans on the 4th, arrived at this port at an early hour this morning.

General Sherman has issued an order, notifying refugees from Texas that United States troops are now in possession of that State, and that they can return to their homes with security, and resume possession of their property. The order also notifies the people of Texas that no home guards or armed bands for self-protection will be permitted in the State, as the military forces of the United States will be sufficient to protect their persons and property. All acts of the Governor and Legislature of Texas since the passage of the ordinance of secession are declared illegitimate.

Davis' Trial by Military Commission.
New York, July 11.—The World's Washington special says: It is now regarded as quite certain that a special Military Commission will be instituted in a short time for the trial of Jeff. Davis, on a charge of complicity in the assassination of President Lincoln. The discovery of additional evidence, involving Davis, is said to be the cause of the transfer of his case from a civil to a military tribunal.

In this connection, it may be added that Prof. McCullough, the rebel inventor of a way for overcoming certain obstructions, supposed to refer to rebel plots to burn cities, as alluded to in the evidence of the late conspiracy trial, was brought here to day and placed in prison.

Governor Brownlow's Proclamation.
CINCINNATI, July 11.—A special to the Gazette says: Governor Brownlow, of Tennessee, has issued a proclamation declaring the franchise law the supreme law of the State; denouncing as rebels those who attempt to oppose its execution. He calls upon the civil authorities to arrest persons who, under pretense of being candidates for Congress, are advising the people to nullify the Constitution and laws, and are stirring up rebellion and sedition. The proclamation also announces the arrest of Emerson Etheridge, at Columbus, by the commander of the post, for delivering incendiary speeches in Tennessee.

Gen. Hooker's Verdict in the Osborn Case.
New York, June 11.—Gen. Hooker has arrived here and reported to the War Department for orders.

D. S. Osborn, the naval reporter, who was under arrest, charged with publishing contradictory news has been notified by Gen. Dix that he has approved the findings of the Court in his case, which was not guilty.

Attack Upon an Internal Revenue Collector.
LOUISVILLE, July 10.—Phillip Speed, Collector of Internal Revenue, was assailed while going home, on Saturday evening about 11 o'clock, by three men in the garb of soldiers, one of whom with a boulder knocked in several of his teeth, inflicting a serious wound. Mr. Speed thinks their purpose was robbery. Mr. Speed is doing well.

Mass Meeting at Lexington, Ky.
CINCINNATI, July 11.—An enthusiastic Union mass meeting was held at Lexington, Ky., yesterday. Speeches were made by Mr. Kason, of Lowell, and General P. B. Blair, urging the adoption of the Constitutional amendment.

The innocence of Mrs. Surratt.
WASHINGTON, July 11.—The confessor of Mrs. Surratt, the Rev. Mr. Walters, says that as God lives, Mrs. Surratt was innocent of the murder of President Lincoln, or of any intent in the conspiracy to murder him.
