

EASTERN STATES AND THE TARIFF

There can be no question but that to New England the country is indebted for the fallacious policy of the protective tariff, a policy wrong in principle and especially burdensome to the agricultural States.

We will take the Journal's own figures, in part, to show the comparative interests in the tariff policy between the Eastern and Western States.

In the articles enumerated there is a total excess in favor of the Eastern States of \$211,116,084.

The total annual products of manufacturing industry in the Eastern States is \$1,298,207,053. The total products in the Western States is \$390,411,942—showing an excess in favor of the Eastern States of \$907,795,111.

Do not these figures demonstrate most conclusively that the Eastern States have a preponderating interest in manufacturing over the rest of the Union, and that the agricultural interests are made subsidiary to the manufacturing by a discriminating protective tariff in favor of the former?

These tables show, most conclusively, that the preponderating interest of Massachusetts is manufacturing, while that of Indiana is agricultural. The interest of the former is protected by a high tariff discriminating in its favor, while the industry of the latter has but little, and needs not any.

FREE TRADE AND NATIONAL REVENUE.

The future historian, to whom we are all so fond of appealing, will doubtless have to make a good many conclusions as to the origin of the great evil war which did not just now find currency in the loyal League, and it is quite within the limits of possibility that the origin will be traced to the selfish system of "protection" by means of the national debt, which has been reported in no inconsiderable measure to defend it.

Less than forty years ago the dissolution of the Union was to some one of the most important causes of New England "protectionism," on the floor of the Senate, as a more tolerable alternative than the establishment of a free trade in America; and the indecent haste which the New Englanders in Congress made to avail themselves of the outbreak of the civil war as an opportunity for imposing new fetters upon American industry and enterprise, gives permanent, ineffaceable color to the assertion, that a local loss of national disposition had no small share in excluding the heirs of the Hartford Convention, and of the anti-Texas secessionists of '45, to that display of loyalty to the Union which they astonished the nation four years ago.

But, as it may, the demands of the national treasury, charged with the duty of maintaining the land monopolies, but the nation's credit and good faith, will inevitably compel, and at no distant day, a complete revision of our tariff, and the emancipation of producers and consumers throughout the country, and the withdrawal of legislation for a class, as the only practical way of filling the nation's exchequer and saving us from public bankruptcy.

To that dishonor the country will never submit. The Harbinger Patriot, of June 13, published a letter from an imaginary loyal office holder, to a clerical friend, which is one of the best specimens of political satire we have read in a long period.

"What shall I change it to? If I call myself Greeley, they might think that I wrote that poetry about the 'haunting lie' and the 'starry garb.' If I call myself Garrison, they will swear that I am the one that denounces the Country without an agreement with hell! I call myself Sumner. I might be mobbed for saying that the man who obeyed the Constitution was a dog! If I took the name of W. H. Chase, they would know that I should be followed up as the howling ulster, who said that if God Almighty did not abolish slavery, he was a very great scoundrel! And I certainly should not call myself Phillips, for fear of taking the name of that noble martyr, who proposed to repudiate the national debt. * * * I have to drop my old name and take a new one, you have a d--d poor assortment in the Abolition vocabulary to choose from."

Judge Thompson, of Pennsylvania, in a recent decision, gave expression to the following noble sentiments: "The writ of habeas corpus is the angel of safety in civil society. Indeed, I look upon an attack on the privilege of the writ to be more dangerous than an attack on the life itself, by just the difference between an irreparable injury to one and an irreparable injury to all."
