

GENERAL NEWS.

THE TRIAL OF WERTZ.  
CORBETT'S TESTIMONY REJECTED.  
From Hayti and St. Domingo.

New York, September 1.—The Herald's Ja-  
maica correspondent says that the revolutionists in  
the island are making in Hayti has been  
decried by President Geffard sufficiently alarm-  
ing to induce him to make preparations for  
escape from his country.  
A mail steamer has therefore been chartered  
at Kingston to proceed to Port au Prince and  
there remain till the time arrives for him to seek  
safety in flight, or till the danger of such an  
event has passed.  
Owing to the severe draught of the present  
summer in the island of Jamaica, the heavy  
taxes and other causes, the negro laborers  
there have been reduced to the most abject  
poverty and great suffering, and thousands of  
them are on the verge of starvation. The  
Government and its officers are the  
cause of their afflictions, and so strong and bitter  
is the feeling against the local government that  
an outbreak on their part is feared in the western  
part of the island, in consequence of which two  
gunboats have been dispatched to that locality.  
The Herald's Santiago correspondence says:  
Notwithstanding the havoc and spoliation of the  
Spaniards during the invasion of San Domingo,  
merchants, crops are now coming forward which  
promise ample subsistence for the inhabitants,  
and that the sacrifices which the war has com-  
pelled them to endure, have made them more  
united and determined to maintain their inde-  
pendence.  
This latter statement is hardly borne out by  
reports which we have already published of  
threatened hostilities between two chiefs—Gen-  
eral Pimental and General Milla. It is said that  
the Spaniards stole and destroyed large quantities  
of fine goods, principally the property of American  
merchants, which had been stored at different  
places, and now General Gaudin, the Spanish  
commander, having withdrawn his troops from the  
interior, has blockaded the principal ports of  
the Republic, because the Dominican Govern-  
ment will not submit to his haughty and un-  
reasonable demands in the peace treaty, thus  
preventing the exportation of large stocks of to-  
bacco belonging to Americans, as well as Eu-  
ropeans.  
The Dominicans have determined to commis-  
sion a privateer to cruise in the neighborhood,  
and an agent authorized to issue letters of  
marque has already left for the United States  
and Europe.

THE WERTZ TRIAL—Boston Corbett's  
Testimony Rejected.  
New York, September 1.—The Herald's  
Washington special says: It is understood that  
Wertz, to-day, (Sat.) will place in the hands of  
his counsel, voluminous documentary evidence  
to prove that in establishing the dead line within  
the Andersonville prison yard, and shooting  
prisoners who crossed it, he in the first instance  
acted under direct orders of the rebel General  
Winder, and more largely by emphatic orders of  
J. A. Seddon, rebel Secretary of War.  
The commission now trying Wertz decided to  
reject the testimony of Sergeant Boston Corbett,  
which appeared in the records of the Court  
two days this week, on the ground that he is  
a monarchist upon the subject of the Anderson-  
ville cruelties.  
The records of Andersonville prison, captured  
by Gen. Winder, are missing. One of the clerks  
of the Quartermaster's department, who accom-  
panied the expedition, and in whose hands the  
records were last seen, has been placed under  
arrest by the military authorities until he can  
give a satisfactory account of the disposition he  
made of them. It is thought by some that the  
records were stolen instead of being lost, for  
the purpose of preventing them from being used  
as evidence against Wertz.

THE REVOCATION OF BUDLEY'S PARDON.  
New York, Sept. 1.—The Herald's Richmond  
correspondent says: The order for revoking the  
pardon of Mr. Dudley, the President of the York  
Railroad, emanated from President Johnson  
himself, in consequence of Dudley, subse-  
quent to receiving the Executive clemency,  
having indulged in strange and unusual language,  
It is said that certain Virginia banks have  
been receiving rebel money up to the present  
time in liquidation of liabilities due them.
