THE CONDITION OF WERTZ.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—Certain papers, whose course in regard to finances has always been inimical to the Government, are seeking on the fact of a further issue of compound interest notes to assert that the volume of the currency is being largely increased. This is untrue. All the compound interest notes being put out are exchanged for those of older date, bearing interest, which accumulation of interest is saved the Government by the cancellation of old notes, or they are used in exchange for the five per cent. notes or for the redemption of certificates of indebtedness.
