THE ANDERSONVILLE PRISON.

GEN. SAXTON'S REPORT.

Sale of Railroad Stock.

VISIT TO ALEXANDER H. STEPHENS.

The Andersonville Prison—Trial of  
Deceased for the Larceny of the  
Prisoners' Records—Affairs in  
Florida.  
New York, Sept. 14.—The World's special  
says: A letter was received here to day from  
Andersonville, containing interesting particulars  
to the friends of the deceased soldiers buried  
there. The National Guard-yard is being im-  
proved and beautified, there being 13,019 bodies  
lying in it. This enterprise is under the im-  
mediate charge of Captain W. A. Griffith, who has  
been at work there since May last. All of the  
old buildings are standing, stockades, hospitals,  
&c., as when they contained 35,000 prisoners,  
being the largest number ever there. No bodies  
can be removed until November, as the military  
authorities prevent it. After the first of Novem-  
ber the relatives of those who are  
interested there can procure metal coffins at that  
place for transportation to any part of the Union.  
Persons who do not care, or have not the means  
to visit that place, can have the bodies sent by  
express, by application to T. B. Book. The  
graves are all numbered, and easily ascertained.  
Deceased prisoners, of the Southern Dis-  
trict of Florida, arrived in this city this morning.  
An attempt is being made to test the Maryland  
registration law at a hearing of a mandamus  
case against the Registrar of the adjoining County  
of Montgomery, instituted in the Circuit Court,  
before the Hon. Judge Bayne.  
The petition was dismissed by the Court and  
an appeal was taken to the Appellate Court of  
the State, sitting at Annapolis. This brings  
the matter to an early test.

Herschel V. Johnson's Visit to A. H.  
Stephens.  
New York, Sept. 15.—A special to the  
Herald, dated Washington, says: Herschel V.  
Johnson, of Georgia, returned to Washington  
to-day from a visit to Alexander H. Stephens, in  
Fort Warren. He spent last Friday with Mr.  
Stephens, and reports him in ordinary health and  
as comfortably situated as any one can be in con-  
finement. He has freedom of the fort and is  
allowed to receive the visits of friends, quite as  
many being admitted as he desires. His brother,  
Linton Stephens, who accompanied Mr. Johnson  
to Fort Warren, remains in the city, and is per-  
mitted to sleep in his brother's apartments and  
join him in his walks for exercise. Mr. Johnson  
will probably not be pardoned until the question  
of reconstruction is practically settled by the ad-  
mission of representatives from the Southern States.

Gen. Saxton's Report.  
New York, Sept. 15.—The Tribune's Wash-  
ington special of the 14th says: A report from  
General Saxton, Assistant Commissioner of the  
Prisoner's Bureau for the States of South Caro-  
lina and Georgia, has just been received. It  
details the circumstances of the murder of  
Captain Healey, one of his agents at Augusta,  
on the 24th. It also states that an unsuccessful  
attempt was made on the life of Gen. Wild,  
and that Captain Bryan, an officer of the Bu-  
reau, has been anonymously notified that he will  
next be assassinated. Captain Healey was his-  
trically murdered, while returning from his office  
in the evening. Gen. Wild, who has three chil-  
dren, three of which took effect in his body,  
and either of which would have produced all  
most instant death. His insinuating body was af-  
terwards mutilated with knives by the cowardly

The Freedmen's Bureau.  
New York, Sept. 15.—Col. Brown, Assis-  
tant Commissioner of the Freedmen's Bureau  
for the State of Virginia, reports to Gen. How-  
ard from Virginia, that he has reason to believe  
that the fear recently expressed by a number of  
citizens of Virginia of an insurrection by the  
freedmen of that State is entirely groundless.  
Gen. Terry has no objection to his troops  
throughout the State so to enable him to effec-  
tually quell any attempt of the kind by the ne-  
groes.  
Gen. Howard, of the Freedmen's Bureau, to-  
day made a thorough inspection of most of the  
homes of the colored people of Washington, and  
reports them as being comfortable and probably  
better cared for than those residing in any other  
section of the country.

More Pardons.  
New York, Sept. 15.—The Times' Wash-  
ington special of the 14th says: The President to-  
day pardoned Menzel Reed, of Bedford County,  
Pennsylvania. This is one of the brothers of  
Reed who recently figured in the Habeas Corpus  
Case in Philadelphia, in which there was a con-  
flict of authority between the National Govern-  
ment and State courts.  
Reed is in custody on a warrant charging him  
with the crime of treason, and the President's  
pardon recites the fact, and pardons him of that  
offense.  
Reward for the Capture of Those  
Engaged in the Assassination Plot.  
New York, Sept. 15.—The parties entitled  
the reward for the capture of those engaged in  
the conspiracy plot, and the assassination of the  
late President Lincoln, have been selected by  
the War Department, and it is understood that  
their names will be made public shortly.  
Promotions for those officers conspicuous in  
bringing the conspiracy to justice, have been  
made out, and are awaiting the signature of the  
Secretary of War, who is now absent from the  
city.

Government Sale of Railroad Stock.  
New York, Sept. 15.—The extensive Gov-  
ernment sale of locomotives and cars will begin  
at Portland, Me., on the 17th, and follow with  
Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Alexandria,  
and other points. Lively competition is ex-  
pected.  
A large amount of the military railroad stocks  
in Virginia has been leased to the railroads of  
that State until the Government is ready to sell  
the same.  
Statement Contradicted.  
New York, Sept. 15.—The statement recently  
published in a New York paper that the Sec-  
retary of the Treasury had decided to issue 50  
bonds in exchange for compound interest notes,  
is without foundation.  
The Secretary has various financial measures  
under consideration, but has taken no definite  
action on any of them.
