GENERAL NEWS.
THE CHOLERA RAVAGES.
SOUTHERN AFFAIRS.

United States Depositories.
New York, Sept. 22.—Fayette McMullan, of
Virginia, who was conspicuous as a conspirator
in the latter days of the rebel Congress, was
today pardoned by the President.
The arrivals from the South continue to in-
crease, and now comprise fully one-half of the
visitors at the hotels.
Applications from banks, to be designated
United States Depositories, are received in great
numbers by the Secretary of the Treasury. Not
more than one out of twenty of the applications
receive the favorable consideration. There have
been more depositories designated than is war-
ranted by the exigencies of the Government, or
the various communities in which they are locat-
ed. In view of this fact, the Secretary of the
Treasury has determined to sparingly designate
banks for the purposes named, and as near as
possible confine the number in thickly populated
regions—one United States Depository in each
Congressional District. In sparingly settled com-
munities the number will be less.

The Hundred Dollar Counterfeit.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—A thorough and most
rigid investigation is being made by Secretary
McCullough into the mystery of the \$100 coun-
terfeit interest. This is undoubtedly the most
dangerous counterfeit that has as yet ap-
peared, and may well challenge the severest sur-
vey of the bank note companies, and all who
have been employed in any wise upon the Gov-
ernment's debt and plates. The face of this note
is a most accurate imitation of the genuine, while
the back is either the genuine Government plate
or an electrotype from it. It seems settled that
the original plates engraved by the Bank Note
Company have been allowed to get into improper
hands.

Southern Post-Offices—Treasury Mat-
ter.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—Governor Randall,
acting Postmaster General, has ordered the
closing of twelve additional Southern post off-
ices, among which are Moultrie, N. C., Abbeville,
Spartanburg, and Lincoln, S. C., and Tallahassee,
Florida.
The Tribune's special says: It has been de-
cided by the Secretary of the Treasury to ac-
cept the payment of the interest on the 5-20
bonds, which became due on the 1st of Novem-
ber, and the same will be paid on and after Sep-
tember 25th, on the presentation of the coupons to
the Assistant Treasurer, or those designated
depositories authorized to pay the interest on
Government securities.

Letter from Mr. Raynor.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—Kenneth Raynor
writes a letter from North Carolina to an officer
in this city, in which he states that unless the
Government compels the rebels to treat the
freedmen with less cruelty, there will certainly
be a rising of the negroes, and bloody retaliation
therein. He is preparing a letter for publication,
in which he will give a full account of the true
condition of affairs in the Southern States. Mr.
Raynor's earnest efforts in the Freedmen's cam-
paign, in Pennsylvania and elsewhere, will be
remembered, and his consistency during the past
four years, justifies the expectation of his many
friends throughout the country.

Ravages of the Cholera.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—The State Depart-
ment is in receipt to-day of voluminous dis-
patches from our Consuls at Constantinople,
Smyrna, Port Maitland and Batavia, giving the
latest information of the ravages of the cholera in
various parts of Europe.
The reports from Constantinople are most
alarming; the deaths from this disease having
reached the number of 2,000 per day; and the
epidemic was checked some time since; but it
has broken out afresh and is now spreading to
a frightful extent.
