understood, in the position they now occupy, and for centuries have done.  
The operation of this system is, by the consolidation of powers and the application of mere force, to arrest the progress of improvement in the science of Government, and in the condition of the people, and to free States most respected, as much as they are the means for their improvement.

**Later from New Mexico.**  
The Santa Fe mail of the 1st of June reached Independence, Mo., on the 21st. The St. Louis Intelligence of the 24th says:  
Among the passengers were Mr. Greiner, late Secretary of the Territory, and Mr. Ballou, a member of the Senate. The trip was very pleasant. On the Arkansas, near Fort Atkinson, a large number of Indians—Caucasians, Kiowas, Cheyennes and Arapahoes—were collected, waiting for the arrival of the Santa Fe trip. The ship was very comfortable, and was expected with presents for distribution among them.  
The news from New Mexico is interesting. Early in May a party of Navajos came down on a trail on the west side of the Del Norte, and on the west side of the Del Norte, who were herding animals, took captive five children, and ran off a quantity of stock. The Indians concerned in the party were known to be belonging to Black Eagle's band, which includes the Canon de Chelly. Upon demand being made, the prisoners and stolen animals were restored; but the chief said he could not surrender the murderers, because they were to be dealt with by the Navajos. Black Eagle was then informed that the murderers must be given up before the full moon (about the 20th of June), or force would be used to compel the surrender of the matters at that date. A summer was proposed to march into the Navajo country in three divisions, and would pursue an energetic course. These Navajos are said to be very well off, and have an abundance of stock and one half million of dollars in silver and gold.

**ESSENTIALS AND THE ADMINISTRATION.**  
It is well known to our readers, that there are two distinct systems of foreign policy, each of which has its advocates and supporters. The one purports to conduct our external affairs upon principles of the utmost liberality and friendship; the other, pretending that it sees moral, physical or political necessity, looks forward to the adoption of a progressive policy—to the acquisition of territorial domains—to intermeddling in the domestic concerns of nations, and to a non-fulfillment of the obligations of treaties. The first is the system of the Fathers of our country, of the sages and patriots of the revolution. The latter is the system of a new school of politicians, who have been spawned in the hot-bed of faction. It is the system adopted by the friends of the present Administration, and is presented to us under the specious name of patriotism. It has always been believed that the true interests of this country would be promoted by avoiding all entangling alliances with other nations. Steadily pursuing this course, while they have been desirous to manifest the most cordial good will to all nations, and to maintain with each relations of commerce, regulated and adjusted by rules of the most fair, equal and perfect reciprocity, the United States have hitherto sedulously abstained from associating themselves in any other way, even with those nations for whose welfare the most lively interest has been at all times felt, and otherwise manifested.

**FOURTH OF JULY.**  
The National Anniversary has returned to us again—and from the rockiest ridges of Yankeeedom to the richest places of El Dorado; for thousands of miles North and South, and for thousands of miles East and West; from the Lakes to the Gulf, and from the Atlantic to the Pacific Ocean, millions of men are celebrating the day and the deed which hallowed it. States which in 1776 were uncultured wildernesses—great cities that in 1787 were only the resorts of nomadic Indian tribes are now alive with all the noise and excitement of the holiday of the nation, recording their estimate of the worth of the Declaration and the Constitution which succeeded it. The property which Webster so eloquently attacked in his address, with regard to the honor and illumination that should in future years be celebrated the glory of this day, has been more than realized. Throughout States almost thriving in number those of the old federation, and cities in population surpassing the States of that period; throughout towns that dot the face of the country like stars, and villages too numerous to be reckoned; by men of all nations, all religions, and all professions, the Fourth of July is honored and observed.

Some of the most important empires on the globe are, says the New York Herald, now ruled by young men. The Emperor of China, Hien Fung, is now in the twenty-second year of his age, and the third of his reign. It will be recollected that he is of the Tartar or Tching dynasty. Prince Xien-tsin, of the Ming dynasty, who appears to the throne of China, is about thirty years of age. The Sultan of Persia, Nasr-ud-Din, is about twenty years of age. Abd-ul-Medjid-khan, the Sultan of Turkey, was born in April, 1823—of course he is now little over thirty years of age. The Emperor Francis Joseph, of Austria, is nearly twenty-three. Having been born in August, 1830. He ascended the imperial throne in December, 1835. These empires embrace more than one-third of the population of the world.

The Bank of England has increased its stock of bullion in one week from £7,494,577 sterling to £7,825,934 sterling. Increase £331,357— and it is now daily adding to its treasure. The amount of notes in circulation was, on the 23d inst., according to the return made last June £7,292,535 sterling, being an increase of £533,399.

**SCHEAR AND MORGAN'S SPECULATIONS.**—As a matter of some interest to our merchants we clip the following from the St. Louis Evening News of the 25th ult.:  
"Dealers in these articles made a 'wild man' this year, and if a majority who purchased largely were not in the same boat with balanced accounts, they may doubtless be so. The difficulty has been this. The crop was an increased one, and not known precisely to what extent, dealers bought two weeks ago at the close of the season, and sold at a loss. The crop was not so large, and still continues so. At no time has there been anything like a scarcity of cloth, but receipts have been constant and steady, with the demand for or for better than family in pieces than we remember to have noticed a season before. Sugars are at about 10 to 12, and flour is at the quoted ruling rates at present. Molasses has declined, and is not so much in demand as it was at the opening of the season. We have no means of ascertaining the precise amount of either, but we are assured that it is sufficient for at least two months, should not our other highest or barrel arrive."

**CLIPPER SAILING.**—Our Eastern exchanges exhibit in honest pride over the extraordinary speed attained by our clipper ships over those of the Old World and former times. The clipper ship Flying Cloud has performed a prodigy of speed, as will be seen by the following extract from her log, received from her captain, G. C.
