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## The President's Journey North.

RECEPTION AT WILMINGTON - The Committee of Reception from Philadelphia arrived at Wilmington on the morning of the 12th instant, and were met at the depot by the Delaware Committee of Reception. The two committees proceeded in company at once to Elkton, Md., by a special train, where the President arrived from Baltimore at 10 o'clock, accompanied by his suite, consisting of the following members of his Cabinet: Hon. W. Guthrie, Secretary of the Treasury; Hon. J. Davis, Secretary of War; Hon. C. Cassing, Attorney-General; Hon. J. Campbell, Postmaster-General; Sidney Webster, Esq., the private Secretary of the President, also accompanied him.

On the train reaching Elkton, President Pierce was introduced to the citizens, who were gathered in large numbers on the station, and were welcomed to the State of Delaware, by Mr. Askew, standing on the platform of the car. The President made an appropriate response, which was greeted with loud applause, and the train moved off amid prolonged cheering towards this city.

On reaching Wilmington a national salute was fired in honor of the distinguished visitor from a battery provided by the citizens. The President and suite were placed in carriages, and a procession was formed and proceeded to the City Hall, where the formal reception by the citizens of Delaware took place. The Mayor of Wilmington, Mr. Askew, was introduced to the citizens by Dr. Askew, after which Mayor Aldridge welcomed him to the city in a cordial address, to which the President responded, returning thanks for the enthusiastic reception which he had received, and expressing himself from making a longer address, being prevented by a cold which he had contracted last night whilst addressing the citizens of Baltimore.

The President then retired, amid the cheering of the people, to the Indian Queen Hotel. The Mayor of Wilmington handed over his guests to the Mayor of Philadelphia, who was accompanied by a large number of citizens, and the President's departure was marked by a salute from the battery of the City of Philadelphia.

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
