On the 21st, January 2, 1854.—The news that an attempt would be made to send the Ottoman army at Kalesha was officially announced to the representatives of the Powers. A convoy carrying 16,000 men to reinforce the army of Asia, will set out for Batoum on the 2d inst. The weather is not so bad now, and the wind is veering to the south.

Five Turkish ships accompany the combined fleets in the Black Sea. On the 20th of December there have been 40,000 men of the corps under Oster-Sacken in Wallachia. In Persharia a new concentration of troops is going on. Near Kremnitsa and Chasov are made for the establishment of 10,000 men. These will be composed of 10,000 men of the 1st Division of the Grand Duke of Mecklenburg. The corps which will be composed of 100 guns of large calibre; the construction of the fortifications near Bucharest continues northward. Two companies of Grenadiers have arrived for that purpose from Gruzeta at Bucharest. The offensive movements of the Russians have commenced on a grand scale. The corps of Oster-Sacken advances in the midst of ice. The Russian army under Wallachia has advanced in three columns. The corps which operated against Kalesha is estimated at 25,000 men. The second marches through Karakal, and the third along the Aluta. The destruction of the passes in Lesser Wallachia will be considered as completed.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 4, 1854.—An extreme irritation against England and France prevails. The Emperor has conferred the insignia of St. George of the 12th Order on Prince Bismarck. On the 21st of this month, a division, 15,000 strong, with fifteen pieces of artillery, attacked the entrenched position of Glatz, not far from Kalesha, and took it by storm. The Russian army numbered 25,000 men. A reinforcement of 18,000 men marching from Karakal, was forced to retire with a loss of 250 men.

Genoa, Jan. 9, 1854.—Numerous refugees have embarked for Constantinople. The Austrian officials have been committing another outrage on a subject of the United States. The Rev. John C. Richmond, a preacher of the Anglo-Catholic Church, and one of the correspondents of the Daily News. After setting the police to watch him, causing anonymous letters to be written to him, and he being invited to his residence, he was, on the 25th of December, surrounded by the constabulary of the gendarmes at Beckenstein, in Hungary, who intimated that he had orders from the highest authorities in Hungary to subject the Rev. Mr. Richmond's personal effects to examination.

Mr. Richmond protested against this invasion of the sacred private rights of an American citizen, and was then told that he must remain quietly in his official residence, and that he must be further ordered. The Rev. Mr. Richmond, who is a native of New York, and a member of the American Episcopal Church, was, on the morning of the 26th he was roused from his bed by a gendarme, who compelled him to leave his residence in a jolly wagon, and amidst a violent snow-storm, and over frozen roads, conveyed him to Felchhaus. There he arrived two hours before the midday train, by which he had voluntarily promised to leave, but so exhausted that he could not continue his journey.

At night he hoped to rest, but the gendarmes burst into his room, and threatened to shoot him if he did not rise. He remonstrated, showed his passports, covered with signatures of Austro-Bavarian officers, and pointing to the word "America" told them that he was a resident of the United States and declared that the rights of an American citizen should not be violated with impunity; but, with brutal coercion and threats, he was compelled to rise, and he was under arrest. He was then taken to the guard-room, subjected to another search, and quarantined, and gendarmes were ordered to guard him. In the morning he asked permission to write the American Ambassador in Vienna, but this was refused. At ten o'clock he was taken to the possible consular office of the United States, offered to restore his passports and set him at liberty, if he would immediately depart. This offer was refused.

Two Polish officers, (names not stated), have been appointed Generals of brigade in Austria. The London News complains that the English engineers who were on board the Turkish steamer, are treated by the Russians as common prisoners, and are confined in prison on an allowance of six cents per day. Mr. Bell, the engineer of the Parus Bahari, an Egyptian steamer that was taken by the Russians, has been ordered to return to his country. The Independence Bell publishes a dispatch from Constantinople, January 2, which probably represents the facts as they actually occurred.
