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Another Railroad. A company to be called North and South Railroad Company is projected, for the purpose of buying the entire property of the Florence and Keyport Company, and making a direct line of communication between New York and Philadelphia.

Funeral of Miss Fillmore. Miss Fillmore, whose death by cholera we announced yesterday, was buried at Buffalo on the 27th ult. Her funeral was attended by a large concourse of leading citizens. More deep-felt and general grief was seldom witnessed than was manifested throughout that city. Mr. Fillmore feels it keenly, and his spirits are much broken. The young lady was twenty-two years of age.

Death of Jacob Richardson. Jacob Richardson, formerly Collector of the port of Georgetown, N. Y., and the alleged defaulter for \$100,000, died on the 25th ult., at Kingston, Canada, after a short illness.

Fatal Accident. James F. McCarty, Dockmaster at Troy, N. Y., while at work in a mill factory, on the 27th ult., was instantly killed by a derelict breaking and falling upon him. He leaves a wife.

United States Steamer Princeton. It is rumored that Secretary Dobbin has appointed a commission of officers at Washington to examine into the report relative to the last trial trip of the steamer Princeton. It is thought that the Navy Department will finally decide to sell the steamer, as she is unfit for war purposes.

Later from Havana.

The United States mail steamer Oahawha, R. W. Shufeldt, Commander, from New York July 25, and Havana the 31st, arrived at Mobile on Wednesday.

The Spanish Royal Mail steamship Velasco arrived at Havana, San Puerto Rico, from Cadix, on the 26th ult., having left the latter port on the 1st.

The Velasco brought out to Puerto Rico and Cuba intelligence of the insurrection which, headed by General O'Donnell and General Dales, had broken out at Madrid, which had been received by the people at Havana with the utmost indifference; those seeming to have any opinion at all upon the subject would prefer any thing to an O'Donnell Administration in Spain.

Since the arrival of the Marquis de la Penonuela, who is looking for corn and other articles, and there are, it is stated, upwards of 2,500 Bazar negroes in the hands of the Government, which have been captured by his orders, while being attempted to be clandestinely landed on the coast, and are being brought in from the country almost daily.

Upwards of one thousand troops have arrived recently from Spain, and the steamers Isabel and Colon, and line of battle ship Soberano, are expected in course of a few days, with about fifteen hundred men, and a large quantity of arms.

The Captain General issued an order on the 28th ult., that any one who would capture and deliver to the Government negroes newly imported from Africa should receive a bonus of ten dollars for each man, six dollars for each woman, and three dollars for each child, and if the captor should be a property holder he should have the negroes adjudicated to him as apprentices, on the usual terms. This order, if properly complied with, will stop the African slave trade, and thus destroy the last remnant of this trade.

The Queen has granted permission to the municipality of the city of Havana to open a subscription for the purpose of erecting a monument to Columbus, under which shall be deposited the ashes of the great Admiral, now resting in a simple niche on the right hand side of the high altar of the Cathedral of Havana. [Eve. Picayune.]

Further by the Africa. A new defeat of the Russians on the banks of the Danube, and a confirmation of the news of a severe check to the Turkish army in the Caucasus, were the chief items of the war since the departure of the last paper.

Another Failure. Scranton, July 27. The Erie Railroad and Five Insular Companies has failed. A temporary injunction was granted two weeks ago by Judge Cary, and notice of application for the receiver given, returned to-morrow. The company joined the other companies in the same failure.
