Mobile Cotton Market.

MOBILE, Sept. 26.—There is a better demand in the cotton market here, and the sales yesterday embraced 1000 bales at steady prices. Middling is quoted at 8 1/2 per lb.

Eastern Mail.

MOBILE, Sept. 26.—The Eastern mail has arrived, bringing dates from New York of the evening of the 19th, the morning and evening of the 20th, and the morning of the 21st inst., as late as due.

NATIONAL GUARDS.—At an election held on Monday evening last for Lieutenant Colonel and Major of the Regiment of National Guards, Capt. J. A. Jacques, of Company B, was duly chosen to the first named office, and Lieutenant Colonel Gerard Smith (resigning the office of Lieutenant Colonel in another regiment for this purpose) was chosen Major.

The field officers of the regiment are thus filled, Colonel Henry Ford having been chosen first in command several weeks since.

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LATER FROM MEXICO.

ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMSHIP ORIZABA.

Execution of Count Raoussat Confirmed.

The steamship Orizaba, Capt. Forbes, arrived at this port yesterday morning from Vera Cruz, which she left on the 23d, having been detained one day by stress of weather.

She brings the following passengers: A Hidalgo, Secretary to Mexican Legation, Washington, D. C.; J. P. Badillo, and several Misses, Capt. G. C. Chapman, and the doctor.

The news from Mexico is of little interest, with the exception of the official account of the trial and execution of Count Raoussat de Boulton at Guaymas. The following is the official dispatch of General Ganez to the Minister of War, published in the *Trait d'Union*:

Most Excellent Sir: On the 9th inst., in ordinary council of War, presided over by General Domingo Ramirez de Arrellano, Colonel of the 1st Battalion, and composed of Captains Antonio Mendez, J. N. Arroyo, Domingo Isidro, Julio Gomez, Venancio Dominguez and Luis Campos, the charge preferred in due form against the Count Gaston de Raoussat de Boulton, was read.

The council, after having heard the defense, and the reading of the charges, and having fulfilled all the legal formalities, unanimously sentenced him to be shot.

Approving this sentence, and after having consulted the assessor, I ordered, on the 10th inst., that he should be executed on the square of the 12th inst., at the same time ordering that the prisoner should be at once prepared for his fate.

During the time that he had yet to live the Count received all the attentions that his situation demanded.

He made his will, freely disposing of whatever articles he possessed in this port; he wrote letters, spoke with one of his fellow countrymen, with the exception of the Vice-Consul for France, to whom he recommended a portion of his last dispositions. In short, every thing compatible with humanity in the circumstances of the case was accorded to him. The execution was duly performed and he was buried in the cemetery of the port, the Rev. Vicario Ovelo.

Finally, on Saturday, the 12th inst., early in the morning, the garrison of this place was under arms, and the troops, according to my directions, was in battle array, not far from the place of execution. Another portion was formed at the latter point in the customary square. All being thus disposed, giving to the Count the last part of the day, according to the justice of the nation, and respect all the requirements of the ordinance having been complied with, the execution was executed, and Count Gaston de Raoussat de Boulton was shot, meeting his death with great courage, and replying as a Christian of his errors. The corpse received Christian interment in the cemetery of the port.

With this communication you will find the testimony on the charges preferred against the unhappy M. de Raoussat. A copy of his testamentary disposition is also annexed; and the commands general has caused it to be fulfilled as far as it belonged to it to do so, by collecting the articles pointed out, and delivering them to the Vice-Consul of France in order that they may be remitted as the testator desired.

JOSE MARIA YANEZ.

The Universal states that the Count requested that he might be allowed to receive his death standing, and that his desire was complied with. The same paper announces that with the exception of Mr. Demas and three officers, who had accompanied the Count to Vera Cruz, and who were being proceeded against at Guaymas, all his misdeeds followed taken by the Mexican authorities had been at liberty and sent back to California.

Mr. Don Francisco Valdes has been appointed Consul of Mexico at New Orleans.

Mr. George Llanes has been appointed Consular Agent for the United States at Sinaloa.

The *Siglo* says that the town of Santa Maria del Rio, in the State of Tamaulipas, has been declared a free town, which will double the value of the property of the town.

The 11th was celebrated with great ceremony, on the anniversary of the victory gained by Santa Anna over the Spaniards who landed at Tampico in 1829.

The Restaurador of Morelia (Michoacan) announces that the insurgent chief, Estrada, had been ordered to the troops of the Government.

In Toluca, the insurgents have been routed with great slaughter. A large party of the rebels attacked the town of Sultepec, which was garrisoned by the troops of the Government, and after a battle of four days duration, were completely routed and put to flight, with the loss of sixty killed and seventy prisoners. Four of the latter who had been taken with arms in their hands, were subsequently shot.

Among the wounded, was the chief Martin Hernandez. On the side of the Government no loss was experienced.

It is said that Don Manuel Fernandez de Cordova has presented to the Supreme Government a project for the organization of Lower California, on an economic plan. The greater part of the colonists are to be Mexicans.

The papers are filled with accounts of the destruction of churches and edifices during the present and past months by lightning. The churches of Santa Ana and San Juan have been struck by the electric fluid, and burnt to the ground.

The young poet, Miguel Losada, who has been engaged in writing an epic on the battle of Tampico, having failed in showing a few days since presented to Santa Anna. After hearing his patriotic effusion, the President complimented the young author very highly and ordered that his poem should be published in the *Diario Oficial*.

Accounts of the cruel and relentless warfare waged by the merciless savages upon the inhabitants of the Northern States continue to crowd the papers, say a writer in the *Siglo*. "As the nations of North America have been the greater portion of a man, a party of savages advanced upon the Church of Alamos de Parais. There they seized a young man, tied a cord around his neck, and hanging him up to a tree, amused themselves by shooting arrows into his body. They cut slices from the loins of a small child, cooked and ate them. The child was still alive."

DEMOCRATIC MASS MEETING.—There was a tremendous outpouring of numbers at the Democratic gathering on the evening of the 18th in Independence Square, Philadelphia, to commemorate the anniversary of the Federal Constitution, and the adoption of the Constitution to the extreme. The delegates marched in procession with torch lights, banners, etc., from the various wards to Independence Square, which was illuminated by a beautiful display of fireworks being illuminated with gas lights and decorated with flags. John Robinson, Jr., presided at the principal stand, and Benjamin Rush at the second stand. The resolutions were read from both stands by J. Murray Rush, and adopted.
