The following letter will give our readers some idea of the opinions entertained of us at the present time by one class of English letter-writers. It is, however, merely a harmless and amusingly ridiculous tirade of gossamer and abuse:

Home politics have of late caused the dangers to Cuba from American aggression to be almost entirely forgotten. The attention of the world is directed to the proceedings and departure have served as a reminder. I have reason to believe that the Spanish Government considers the affair of the Black Warrior as virtually settled. Mr. Soule, in regard to the Black Warrior, has been settled between Seneca, Oregate and the American Government; and even if it had not been so, the recent removal of Gen. Perola from his post of Captain-General of the Island of Cuba would greatly facilitate the settlement of the matter.
