This is right and proper. It is hard for men to be torn from their homes and their families, their wives and their children, but is not a thousandth part as hard as would have been obeying an order of Court, when obedience to that order, according to the dictates of their own consciences, would have involved the commission of moral perjury. Judges may afford to sneer at the entertainment of "conscientious scruples" on the part of those who are in their power to fine and imprison; but it by no means follows that those "scruples" are not founded upon honest convictions, and that they are entitled to respect, instead of sneers and insults.

Messrs. Christy and Horton have done all that honest men could do. They clearly purged themselves of any intention of contempt of court, yet they are fined and imprisoned because they refused to make returns, under oath, of what they knew nothing about—could know nothing about, with absolute certainty! If this is not a new phase of the administration of justice, we are wholly in the dark.

Ordinarily, men are sent to prison for committing perjury. In this case two men are sent to prison because they refuse to commit perjury! This is the substance and effect of the decision, "rough here as you will."

We doubt if the annals of American jurisprudence can furnish a parallel case of downright arbitrary oppression. In the name of God, are men to be imprisoned because they respectfully, yet positively declare to a Judge that they cannot obey his mandate without violating, as they conscientiously believe, their oaths, taken upon the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God!

We learn that the writs of habeas corpus, already used out, will be tried this morning, and can only hope our friends a safe release from their honorable, yet severe, and as we conceive, unjust imprisonment.
