The Plantes in Mobile were burned down on last Saturday morning. It is supposed that the fire was caused by an incendiary.

The British steamer Vulcan, with the 17th regiment, from the Crimea, arrived at Quebec on the 20th inst.

In the trial of William Flato and Ernie Ernie, the latter forming the jury, indicted for serving on board the ship Dragoon, knowing her to be intended for a slave, before the United States District Court at New York, the jury returned a verdict finding Flato guilty and clearing the others.

The steamer Europe, of the Atlantic Mail, arrived at New York on the 18th inst., bringing the total number of passengers from New York to Europe for the season to 1,200.
