The most common cause of accidents is the want of proper attention to the condition of the tracks.

The Arabia at Halifax.

New York, July 28, 1856.—The Royal Mail steamship Arabia, from Liverpool on the afternoon of the 15th, has arrived at Halifax en route for Boston.

A remarkable revolution was taking place in Spain, and had been caused by the forced resignation of the Cabinet.

It broke out in Madrid on the 13th, and the citizens and National Guards fought the regular troops for twenty-four hours.

One account says that the insurgents have proclaimed a republic, and that Gen. Infante, President of the Cortes, had fled to the south.

Other accounts say that the King has fled to the south, and that the Cortes are in a state of siege, and disordered the National Guard.

It is rumored that France will send an army of observation to the Spanish frontier.

The latest dispatches from Madrid say that the insurgents have been successful in Aragon, Catalonia and Valencia, the garrisons generally falling with them.

One hundred and ten persons had been killed by an explosion in the mines at Cardiff, Wales.

The three captives closed on Friday at 71.

Washington Affairs.

Washington, July 28.—Nothing of importance in the Senate.

House.—The Army appropriation bill providing for the withdrawal of military forces from Kansas will further action in Congress, and that the military be disbanded and their arms relinquished.

Shannon has been removed from the Governorship of Kansas, and J. W. Geary, of Pennsylvania, appointed in his place.

Washington, July 29.—The Senate passed several resolutions.

House.—The House amended the Army bill by adopting Sherman's amendment providing for the territorial government of Kansas—freedom of speech and the press—the restoration of the compromise line, the discharge of all political prisoners, etc.

Kansas Affairs.

Topeka, July 28.—Salmon fellow issued a bulletin on the 24th, calling on Missions to go into Kansas and do good.

Under Tombs's bill, Gen. Smith will be arrested. Lane if he enters Kansas, even at the cost of five hundred lives.

Six thousand Missourians have gathered at St. Joseph to intercept Lane's party.

Ninety men from Chicago and thirty from Massachusetts were expected to join Lane at Nebraska City.
