Political Movements—Address to the People.

So far as the people of Louisiana are concerned, one thing is plainly and painfully apparent, viz: political leaders and continually recurring elections will never permit them to subside to a state of necessary and healthy repose.

For weeks it has been authoritatively announced that the Democratic party would hold a State Convention at Baton Rouge on the 18th of May next, for the purpose, as it is reasonably to infer, of making arrangements for the meeting of the Legislature, and of nominating candidates for various important State offices.

Having now conclusively demonstrated, at least to our own satisfaction, that the "largest liberty" may sometimes degenerate into a nuisance, we will proceed to touch upon a few of the points set forth in the "Address of the American members of the Legislature to the people of the State of Louisiana," published elsewhere, as taken from the Baton Rouge Convention of the 21st inst.

Fortunately there is little in the address that calls for the expression of political feeling, notwithstanding it is directed against a Legislature of the dominant party, as the main topics discussed have often been deprecated and denounced in these columns with as much force and severity as we thought they deserved.

Our municipal elections in New Orleans, and the giving the appointment of Constables in the parishes of Orleans to the Governor, is not considered. It is strongly and justly denounced. Well, it ought to be denounced, for it is violative of the fundamental principles of our Government, subversive of the rights of a large portion of our citizens, inconsistent with the genius of our institutions, at war with equity, right and justice, insulting, oppressive and degrading to the colored people.
