St. Louis, March 31.--We have advices from Santa Fe to the 28th ult.

Near El Paso the Indians had killed Judge Hopping, James Lucas and James Habbell.

A letter from Santa Cruz river, under date of February 3, says that the inhabitants of Sonora had no encouragement they would declare themselves independent of Mexico and ask for annexation to the United States.

The whole State is overrun by Indians, who are robbing and murdering the people.

The revolution has entirely ceased, Governor Gordon's party being entirely broken up, and all his own property confiscated. A new governor has been appointed.

Washington News, March 31.--Gen. Cass has entirely recovered from his recent illness and is attending to his duties.

F. B. Miller has been re-appointed District Attorney for Western Virginia.

The Union, this morning, publishes R. J. Walker's acceptance of the Governorship of Kansas.

Mr. Walker says that he does not contemplate that there will be any necessity for resorting to military force to ensure a fair vote of the inhabitants on the Constitution.

A Long Race. Albany, N. Y., March 31.--The New York horse won the hundred mile race in twelve hours and a half--the Albany horse only a quarter of a mile behind.

RESULTS OF HASTY LEGISLATION.--The National Intelligencer mentions an omission, resulting from the haste of the late Congress, which is of little importance. It appears that although the Committee of Ways and Means had reported an item of \$200,000 for the national armory, no such item appears in the law, and the manufacture of arms for the current year must be considerably curtailed, or the financial integrity of the War Department must be exercised to find a method of borrowing from some other source.
