NATIONAL TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION.

SECOND DAY.

The Union met at 10 o'clock yesterday, and was called to order by the President, Mr. Gaddy, of St. Louis.

The Journal was read and approved.

Mr. George A. Bramer was presented as delegate from the Baltimore Union.

The President announced having appointed the standing committees, as follows:

On Appeals.—Messrs. Miesner, Barnes and Sloan.

On Finance.—Messrs. Patterson, Hill, Smith, Mendenhall and G. P. Mendenhall.

On Subordinate Unions.—Messrs. Toof, Hyatt and Aiken.

On Unfinished Business.—Messrs. Graham, Colman and Miesner.

On New Business.—Messrs. Still, Sands and Miesner.

The report of the Executive Committee of the last annual session of the National Union was read. It was lengthy and interesting, and strongly urged, among other things, the erection of an asylum for decayed printers—the State Legislatures, or Congress, to be petitioned for grants of land therefor, and members of the profession requested to contribute pecuniarily. The report also suggested to the Union the necessity of urging upon Congress the establishment of a Government printing office at Washington, "the object of which should be to reform the present corrupt system that entitles to the monopoly of the printing of the public printing." The report was referred to a special committee, as included a variety of subjects.

A misunderstanding with the Philadelphia Union, on some financial matter, was adjusted, upon full explanations being made by the Secretary, and by Mr. Munday, the Philadelphia delegate.

The question of granting a charter to the Baltimore Union was up. After some debate it was ordered that a charter be granted to which application was made by the Baltimore Union, and which application was referred to the Committee on Appeals.

A communication from the Boston Union, intimating that an emergency might arise by which that body would withdraw from the National Union, was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Munday offered a resolution that on Thursday the Union refer to the Committee of the Whole on the state of the craft.

A resolution in relation to making Franklin's birthday a national holiday was laid on the table.

The Chicago Union, through its delegate, Mr. Miesner, offered a resolution for abolishing the "fat department" system in newspaper offices. After some debate, it was ordered that the resolution be referred to the Committee on Finance.

HEAD OF PASSES, MAY 3.—The British frigate Tartar, from Aspinwall, with one hundred and ninety-one of her crew, from the San Juan river, has arrived at Passa la Luna.
