Col. Benton's Second Letter Against the Missouri Emancipation.

St. Louis, Wednesday, May 7, 1857. Messrs. PRICES AND LARK—Gentlemen: I found a letter from each of you waiting for me here on my arrival at this place, and I thank both of you for the trouble I answer them together, to save myself some trouble. It was a poor and miserable perversion of my letter to Col. Benton to represent my opinion as a mere reflection on his character. The letter could bear no such meaning, and the reference to me was plainly a reference to friends whose sentiments agree with my own, and whose names were suitable persons to make known my sentiments to others; and this I am well assured you did. I was opposed to slavery originally, and knew you both to be so. Therefore, I am more obliged to communicate my sentiments.
