PARISH OF PLAQUEMINES, AUGUST 11th, 1857.

FRAGRANT DEATH.—A private letter from Washington county, Iowa, states that a man named Cyrus Wood was killed near the town of Clay on the 19th of July. He was at work in a straw mill, trying on a log with a lever, when it broke in his hands, and fell over upon the saw, which was running at full speed. He was struck in the breast, and fell back upon his body. He expired instantly.

AN INDIAN DANCER OF THE OLDEN TIME.—An old Indian woman, who has done the country good service in her day, is now at Saratoga. She was a Princess of the Onondaga, four or five families of which tribe are at present camped near the Springs, and were long of the Onondaga in 1713.

New York, August 12.—We have the following additional items by the Canada.

The defense of Calcutta is a subject of much anxiety. Volunteers are enrolled, the inhabitants armed, and the public places garisoned.

A letter from an authentic source at Madras has announced the fall of Delhi.

On the 30th of June a British force of 2000 men took a fort and captured or destroyed 1200 men junk, amounting an aggregate of 600 guns.
