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WHO GAINS BY SUSPENSION?

The answer to the above inquiry is very well rendered in the following pertinent paragraph, extracted from an exchange. We quote:

The effect of a suspension of specie payments by the banks is that it transfers the difference of value between the suspended bank and the other banks to the holders of the suspended bank's notes and deposits, that is, to the suspended bank itself...

The above, although correct in the main, was written for a Northern, not a Southern, merchant. There, actual insolvency prevails. There, the merchant and trader and speculator, could not pay their debts...

The pressure upon Southern cities and banks has been brought about by Northern commercial and financial management, not by employ a harsher term, which we could with entire truth and propriety. The business connections existing for years between Northern and Southern ports...

But, notwithstanding these drawbacks, we wish we were half as sure of salvation in the world to come as we are of the triumphant commercial and financial emergence of the South from the disasters which we now upon her. In a very few weeks our solvency, widely, aggregate, unimpaired wealth, and our great credit, cotton, sugar and tobacco, will enable us to dictate our own terms to Christendom...
