1841—A tornado in Ohio half a mile in width...

1842—Christian VIII, King of Denmark, died in the 62nd year of his age and 9th of his reign.

1833—The army of the confederation of Bolivia and Peru, commanded by Santa Cruz in person, was entirely defeated and destroyed, at Yungay, with a loss of 7,500 killed and 3,000 prisoners.

1828—Treaty of peace and commerce signed between the United States and the Republic of Venezuela.

1813—Christopher Martin Wieland, a German author of great repute, died, aged 80.

1800—Thomas Mifflin, an officer of the revolution, died. He was a member of the first Congress, and for many years Governor of Pennsylvania.

1798—The frigate Concord sailed from Portsmouth, N. H., as a present from the United States to the King of Algiers.

1793—Fischer attacked Kaiserslautern, but was repulsed with the loss of 3,000 men and several cannon.

1790—Lafayette, in the Assembly of the States General, supported the motion for the abolition of titles of nobility, from which period he renounced his own and never afterwards resumed it.

1785—Australia first colonized, nearly three centuries after the discovery of the Ladronez by Magellan.

1781—A revolt of 160 of the Jersey line of the Continental Army, was suppressed and two of the leaders executed.

1779—David Garrick, the actor, died. He formed a new era in the English stage, a reform both in the conduct and license of the drama.

1770—Lord Chancellor Yorke committed suicide in the 48th year of his age. He was a distinguished English politician, and his death is ascribed to remorse for neglecting a promise he had made to his brother to accept of no office from the court.

1764—Mr. Wilkes was expelled the British House of Commons, for writing the North Briton, No. 45. This famed individual was subsequently elected for Middlesex, and his election as often voted for by the Commons, though returned by large majorities.

1743—Charles VII of Germany died at Munich, aged 40.

1736—Protestantism, established without any acts of violence in the Protestant religion.

1705—The Earl of Leicester having defeated Henry III, summoned a new Parliament, in which the Commons were first represented.

Thirty-Ninth Congress—Second Session.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—Senators.—A multiplicity of memorials, resolutions, and petitions to mail routes, and other routine business transpired.

Mr. Seward introduced a bill amending the existing laws in relation to mail routes, and to the principal provisions of the bill are to hire ten steamers to be manned, armed and equipped, and to be considered vessels of the navy, to be employed to cruise in any part of the United States, Cuba, Africa, or elsewhere, where the President may judge an attempt is making to carry on the slave trade.

Mr. Kennedy introduced a bill to establish a line of steamers between the ports of Africa and America, and to carry on the slave trade within its limits.
