MONDAY MORNING, APRIL 25, 1899. New Orleans Money Market.

During the week now closing our market has been influenced by the foreign intelligence up to the 19th of Europe. It has, however, only operated on our great product, cotton. The quantity on sale is so limited that nothing material will result from the expected war of disturbing prices. Judging from this, it can be safely assumed that a large share of the gigantic trade in cotton for three months past has been based on speculation and local tendencies. This is evident from the fact a false and shameful freight dispatch, forwarded on the 14th of the month, stating that the President of the United States had received intelligence of the commencement of hostilities in Europe. This dispatch had so much effect that it reduced transactions in cotton from 9000 bales daily down to 500 bales for the day. This great market ought not to have been influenced by so trifling an attempt to hoax. It proves conclusively that theoretical views have a great deal to do with the cotton business of the season. The planters and factors have, however, been the gainers, having obtained good prices, and, moreover, realized the money and proceeds in full. The stock on sale will have moderate effects on the general business of the season. Notwithstanding the war accounts, the tobacco, sugar, and other commodities have moved along as though the war had not occurred. The receipt of a steamer had arrived from the trans-Atlantic route. The most important events of the week are the crosses and the breaks in the leaves along the Mississippi river. This season is destined to be as fruitful of crosses, levee disasters and overflows as the year 1898, when there were about a dozen or more levees broken between New Orleans and the mouth of the Arkansas river. The levee at the mouth of the Arkansas river, in the same neighborhood of the levee on Tuesday night last. The levee at Twelve Mile Point or Sauer's was in 1849. This overflowed the back part of the city, as low as the old Canal and Baronne streets. In the year 1816 there was a levee at Marcy's Point, near a plantation, which overflowed the back part of the city, coming up to the corner of Royal and Canal streets. There were not, however, at that time many buildings below Rampart street. These are the only serious inundations which have occurred to the city within the present century. This, of course, refutes the many reports of letter-writers from here, who fancy our city has been subject to inundation year after year. The intelligence from Liverpool will probably be in the City of Washington of the 13th, due at New York on Tuesday.

Per Entrop: Cotton has continued active through the week, and although prices are not quoted higher, they are generally in favor of the seller, perhaps to the extent of 1/8 to 1/4 in some cases, especially in grades above middling; generally, however, middling grades are obtainable at 7 1/2, 7 1/4, and 7 1/8.

Review of the Markets.

REVIEW OF THE MARKETS. The Exchange market has been fully occupied during the week. The movements to date were somewhat in favor of buyers and remitters, yet they did not realize any advantages that would lead to change in quotations. There were several transactions in Northern funds. The counter rate at the Banks for checks on New York was put, though there were sales early in the day over the counter at 1/2; and we have to note the fact that the rate for 10 days sight is now 5-10 for five days sight, 7-14 for fifteen days sight, 40-45 for thirty days sight, 10-14 for six months sight, and 10-14 for one year sight. In foreign the market was quiet. Sales of clear Sterling were made at 107 1/2 and 108 1/2 and a fraction over. Bills with documents, and bills of exchange, were in demand. The demand for bills of exchange was rather strong, and the demand met at the office. The rate for Paris 100 francs is 12 1/2 for sixty days sight.
