ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMER OCEAN QUEEN.

DEFENSE OF LOUIS NAPOLEON.

CONGRATULATIONS TO THE EMPEROR.

BY THE NATIONAL LIBS.

New York, August 2.-The Vanderbilt steamship

Ocean Queen, which left from Southampton on the

20th ult., arrived at this port, bringing the news of

the Emperor's arrival in Paris, and the death of

the Emperor's mother, which was telegraphed from

Cape Race, and her arrival has been most antici-

ated by the Kangaroo of Cape Race.

The following items were not compressed in the

telegraphic summary previously received.

London, July 30.-The Atlantic Telegraph Com-

pany is actually preparing to commence operations,

and the shares are advancing.

The Paris Monitor of this morning, the 20th, de-

fends the course pursued by the Emperor Napoleon

in concluding a treaty of peace with Austria, and

announces that on yesterday, the 19th, the Emperor

received the great honors and congratulations of State,

which were presented him with congratulatory addresses

of the most gratifying character, expressing the joy

of the French people at the glorious tests of arms per-

formed by the French army, and their satisfaction at

the happy conclusion of peace.

The Emperor, in reply to these congratulations,

made a brief speech, equally justifying the war and

the conclusion of a peace at the present crisis, &c.

LATER FROM ST. LOUIS.

Terrible Outrage of the Indians.

Washington, August 2.-Despatches have been

received here under date of Tuesday, July 16th,

which state that a hostile meeting had taken place

between the Indians and the soldiers of the Oriz-

sonian newspaper. Four soldiers were exchanged

with the Indians, and the remainder of the party

was taken to the fort. The difficulty was satisfactorily settled.

The Opata Indians were committing great ravages

in Northern Sonora, shooting men, ravishing women

and laying waste the country.

The Mexican troops seem to be afraid to attack

them, and they are allowed to continue their depreda-

tions.

An American citizen has been confined in jail at

Magdalen, and fears are entertained that he will be

murdered.

It is impossible to travel with any degree of safety

through Sonora.

Lieut. Mowry, it is believed, will meet with no

opposition as a candidate for Delegate to Congress

from Arizona.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 2.-Horse Man, one of the

Professors of Antioch College, died at Yellow Springs,

last night.

The Alabama Elections.

Mobile, August 2.-The entire Democratic ticket for

the county of Baldwin in Mobile county, has been

defeated by about 500 majority.

Col. Sullworth, the regular Democratic candidate

for Congress in this District, has been elected by

about 3000 majority.

The returns from remote parts of the State have

not yet been received, but there is little doubt that

the Democratic ticket for State officers has been

defeated.
