Two Days Later from California.

The California Overland Mail, which left San Francisco on the 23d ult., reached St. Louis on the 15th inst. The mining news is, as usual, very favorable. The San Gabriel mines in Southern California are highly promising. There are at work in them three hundred men, all of whom are doing well. Two men belonged to the second Mexican company took out in two days washing \$20. This was done with the common wooden box, such as is commonly used by Mexicans. Mr. G. D. Fisher has discovered a rich quartz vein in the San Gabriel region. It has been prospectively and the yield is most encouraging. Some of the rock is richly studded with gold.

The body of Mr. John Bywater, who was supposed to have been murdered near Fort Tejon, has been discovered at Oak Flat. The number of stabs on the body and other indications, left no room for doubt that he had been murdered. A Mexican-Jose Oliver has been arrested on suspicion of having committed the murder.

The San Francisco Herald of the 22d says: The big Floyd, mentioned in the Herald some time ago as having been engaged by the Quartermaster Department, U. S. A., as a transport, will sail for San Pedro on the company of the 6th Infantry, destined for Fort Yuma. The Floyd will take on board at San Pedro, Capt. Garnett's company of the 6th Infantry, and proceed on to Fort Yuma, where the artillery company now stationed at that place will be relieved, and will return to this city on the 10th inst. The company of the 6th Infantry, which is now at Fort Yuma, is also destined for Yuma, to relieve the troops now there. They will go on the steamer Monterey.

San Gabriel, July 19.—To-day, a young man in the employ of Wells, Fargo & Co., at this place, named Obay, F. Harce, aged eighteen years, committed suicide by shooting himself through the head with a revolver. No cause can be assigned for the act.

San Gabriel, July 20.—A man named Thomas O'Donnell, native of Ireland, was accidentally killed in this place this afternoon, by falling from the bridge on the steamer, some forty feet below the surface of the water. The deceased was a native of San Gabriel, and was employed as a stevedore on the steamer. He was a very respectable man, and was highly respected by all who knew him.

An arrival from Oregon, with dates to July 14, brings news of the election of Lansing Stout, Democrat, for Governor of Oregon. The news is official. Isaac J. Stevens, a well known delegate from Washington Territory by a large majority.
