New Orleans Money Market.

The Money market to-day had an appetizing feeling. There was very little paper offering through brokers. The offerings in the market were very moderate. The weather and its changes are watched with more anxiety than the buying and selling of paper, stocks, and so on. Though yesterday morning was the coolest of the season—the thermometer having fallen in the outskirts of the city to 35—it was only momentary. It must be taken into consideration that very dry weather at such a season is not only a blessing, but a necessity, and had followed the usual course, it might have been a very gloomy account from the cotton and sugar regions. A good, poor, or an indifferent yield, King Cotton has more or less influence on the distributors of favors, on the dealers in planters' and merchants' securities. On the street to-day there were some negotiations of paper, maturing next April and May, at the rate of 8 per cent, but the amount of commercial paper in the hands of brokers is very small. There is considerable activity in the general trade of the city. Jobbers, wholesale dealers, and even retail traders, are doing a large business. There does not reach later than the common. True, there are very few planters, cultivators of the soil in general, appearing on the streets. This is readily accounted for, because it is the most perplexing part of the year for the devotees of the soil, and they are required to be at home until the crops are gathered. The dullness in trade is, therefore, readily accounted for. An improvement in the local and retail trade is manifest, and with other transactions there is a large increase of money brought into circulation. The northern money market continues under good auspices, but the cotton and sugar exports of specie have not come to the amount of a great deal of common regarding the yield of the California mines, but it appears that this yield is merely dog up for the advantage of the good old woman on Threadneedle street, London. In fact, the Bank of England is the recipient of all the gold, the yield and returns of the California mines, which are manifested by the banks of the city of New York only having to vault up some \$100,000,000, which amount is \$100,000,000 less than at the corresponding time last year. As Mr. Bull has a large bill of dry goods, hardware, iron and haberdashery in general against it, it may be well to consider how much gold besides our good crop of cotton will be required to liquidate the balances. Quiescent.

The exchange market to-day was very quiet. The current rate for checks on New York was steady at par. At the same time there were sales reported at a less figure, but not supported by results. We have to quote checks to good sight drafts on New York at an 11/16 and 5/16 dis. Five and ten days sight @ 1/4; thirty days sight @ 1/2; sixty days sight @ 1/2; ninety days sight @ 1/2; and 120 days sight @ 1/2. Sterling there were transactions in document bills at 1/4 @ 1/2, and exceptional bills at a higher rate, and discount rates of 10 to 10 1/2 @ 10 1/2. There were large offerings of clear bills, which resulted in greater exactions at 109, 104 @ 10 1/2. It is hardly necessary to call 109, a quotation for buyers. Remittance rates are higher. In France the market presented dull prospects. The current rate for checks on Paris was 100 francs for 310 francs, and 100 francs for 310 francs. There were several offers for other bank shares. Owners of stocks cannot, however, be blamed for holding at the prices which are now exacted, for if a party sells stock they cannot be replaced by investment in paper or other good securities. It is well at times to compare the position of the banks of other cities with our own. We therefore give the following statement of the bank of Liverpool for October 1858-59, as made to the authorities of the State. We do not know under what head the item of outstanding debt can be classified; but it is presumed to be bills receivable under discount, that is, general notes of hand and domestic exchange. There appears, however, a very singular item, which ought to have been charged up to profit and loss long ago, that is, the robbery of the branch of the bank of Portsmouth, which appears to be carried along as one of the assets from year to year. It may be deemed something strange, or it may be very trifling, to compare robbery and stealing with the operations of a bank. But the general position of this bank is weak, if we judge it by the banking law of Louisiana. For instance, there is reported in coin on the 1st of October, 1858, \$47,142. The circulation and deposits, with amount due other banks, foot up \$2,893,708, and should, according to the \$84,586 in specie. Take the condition of the bank in Virginia all round, and with another, they will be placed in a critical position in the event of a hard run.
