FURTHER BY THE STEAMSHIP ASIA.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—The Asia brings some further particulars of the loss of the Royal Charter, from which it appears that few additional bodies have been found, and it is supposed that many are landed in the wreck.

Some disturbances in commercial relations in England are reported, which, however, are confined particularly to the manufacturing interests. It is reported that the King of Abyssinia has fled to France the island and Fort of Masconne in the Red Sea.

Advices from India state that Sir C. Llewellyn has recommended to the British Government the exchange of treaties between the American Minister, Mr. Ward, and the Chinese Government, which took place on the 10th of August.

The letter of October 20th, purporting to have been written by the Emperor Napoleon to the King of Sardinia, has been published. In it, the Emperor says that the question is not whether he did well or ill at Villafranca, but the important point now is to obtain such results by treaties as shall be most favorable to the pacification of Europe.

Private Accounts by the Hungarian. NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Private letters have been received here by the steamship Hungarian, dated Liverpool, November 2d, reporting the Liverpool Cotton market as active on better grades and prices generally in favor of sellers.

Later from Hayti. RECURRENCE OF CONSPIRACIES. NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—By an arrival at this port, we have later advices from Hayti. There have been about twenty individuals convicted of being accessories in the late conspiracy against the life of the President of Hayti, and of the murder of his daughter. Sixteen have already suffered death.

Further by Overland Mail. Appointment of United States Senator. ST. LOUIS, November 15.—By the overland California mail of the 24th, which has now arrived here, we have accounts of a destructive fire which nearly consumed the entire village of York. The fire occurred on the 23d ult. The loss of property is estimated at \$50,000. Many poor families were burned out, and much suffering among them is anticipated.

Domestic Intelligence. Senator Douglas' Health. WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Senator Douglas has somewhat recovered from the severe illness of last week and is considered out of danger. Domestic Markets. NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Wright's circular, which goes out in the next steamer for Liverpool, reports the cotton market steady. Sales of the past week consist of 12,000 bales. The receipts during the same time amount to 9,000 bales. The circular quotes middling Orleans at 12c. The stock on hand amounts to 18,000 bales.

Report of Council proceedings on 2d page. THE INCENDIARIES.—We understand that the police are on the track of some of the incendiaries who lately have laid waste much of our city. Though we could detail particulars, we deem it unnecessary to mention names, as the police are not always the greatest success in their efforts to catch these rascally incendiaries, and we are not advising and informing the one and the other of what is going on.

A TALENTED WIDOW.—A widow named Johanna Camford, living on Constance street, between Galmeis and Brato streets, after carefully placing her youthful charge in the cradle, betook herself first to work, and then to her needle, and finally to her pen, and she has been successful in her various pursuits. Her earnings were regularly sent to her daughter, who was placed in a very "tight place" by the death of her father. By this kind and thoughtful means she was saved.

NOT EXACTLY THE TICKET FOR SOOT.—A policeman of the Third District, who, like all other men, has human weaknesses, but who should at least know a little more of municipal rewards and punishments than his citizens, was generally so, has placed himself in a very "tight place" by the commission of an outrageous assault that may prove fatal to the attacked.

It appears that this policeman, whose name is John Brand, was boarding or partaking of dinner in the same house with a German named Ludwig, and during the meal the latter spilled some soup, an act that met the disapproving eye of Brand, who expressed his disapproval of the conduct in very unmeasured terms, thus provoking Ludwig to remark, "Words—like the case too often—blow on the part of B, who, with a metal weight, tried to do some destruction on the personal appearance of L, but by the timely interference of bystanders was prevented. Being enraged, Brand retired to his room, and the next day waited the passing of Ludwig on his way to his daily work, when (B) deliberately fired a pistol and produced a wound in the region of the head of Ludwig. The unfortunate German was taken to the Hospital, where, on examination, his wound was found to be but slight, owing to the small charge in the pistol. Brand was arrested, and in time will learn that such shots are not exactly the tickets for soap.

DR. RAO'S HON. INQUIRY.—Mr. Murphy, late a resident of Toulouse street, where he met with an accident in falling on the kitchen floor, as previously reported, died of his injuries on Monday night in the Charity Hospital, whither he was moved for medical aid.
