CHARLESTON, Feb. 13.—The steamship Isabel has arrived at this port from Havana, bringing advices from that port to the 5th inst.

The Isabel also brings advices of the most important nature from Vera Cruz to the 4th inst.

Among the passengers by the Isabel is Mr. E. L. Plumb, who comes from the American Legation at Vera Cruz, as bearer of important dispatches to our Government.

The position of the two contending parties had very much altered during the week previous to the capture of Oajaca, and the prospects of the Constitutional Government have very much improved.

The Liberal troops in that quarter had every thing successful, having recaptured Colima, San Luis Potosi, and other important places.

The Church forces had also been defeated near Toluca by the Liberal troops under Gen. Carranza.
