"INTERVENTION" IN THE SENATE.

"INTERVENTION" IN THE SENATE.

The resolutions of Senator Davis, of Mississippi, came up in the Senate of the United States a few days ago, and were faulty disposed of. These resolutions, as is already known, related to the subject of slavery in the Territories, and were brought forward with a view of fixing and settling, if possible, the Democratic creed on this vexed question.

When the resolutions came up Mr. Brown, of Mississippi, offered an amendment declaring that the immediate intervention of Congress was needed for the protection of slavery in the Territories. Mr. Brown has been the sturdy champion of this doctrine ever since the opening of the session, and has fought for it with ability and persistency. But he met with indifferent suncess—only five votes being recorded in the affirmative. These five were those of Mesers. Brown, Hale, Iverson, Johnson, of Arkanssis, and Yulce. Why Hale; who is a pestilent Freesoller, voted for the amendment is something of a mystery—unless indeed he did it by way of a joke. Hale affacts to be a wag. If he did it in earnest, it is amother proof of the truth of the old saying that extremes frequently

meet.

Mr. Collamer, of Vermont, then offered an amendment that no intervention by Congress would ever be required. The Senate had just decided that no intervention was needed at the present time, but they were not willing to go to the extent of saying the necessity for it would not arise in the future. Accordingly, Collamer's amendment was defeated by a party vote—six-teen Black Republicans voting in the affirmative, and thirty-three of the Opposition in the negative. Mr. Clingman, of North Carolina, then offered a resolution that no necessity now exists for Congressional intervention. This appears to be a reverse proposition of that of Mr. Brown—but although Brown's amendment received only five votes, the negative vote on Clingman's resolution amounted to twenty-three. We cannot recouche this discrepancy. But as a part of the political record of the times, and for the purpose of showing low Southern Senators stand upon this question of the power of Congress to protect slavery in the Territories, we append the list of yeas and nays upon the proposition: Yeas: Messre, Einghann, Bragg, Chandler, Biglier, Clingman, Collamer, Crittenden, Dixon, Douittle, Foot, Grimes, Hale, Hamiln, Harlan, Johnson, of Tennessee, Kennedy, Latham, Polk, Pagli, Simmons, Ten Eyyl, Tomba, Turnbull, Wade and Wilson—25.

So Clingman's resolution was passed—and the Senate has therefore expressed its opinion, by a formal resolution, that no necessity now exists for the protection of slave property in the Territories. Every Black Republican Senator present, it will be observed, voted in the affirmative, together with Bigler, Latham, and Pugk, Northern Democrats; Bragg, Clingman, Johnson of Tennessee, Polk and Tosombs, Southern Democrats; and Crittenden and Kennedy, Whigs. Three Northern Democrats, Bright, Lane and Rice, voted in the negative. Douglas was not present.

The question then recentred on the fifth of Mr. Davie' series of resolutions, which is as follows:

Resolved, That if experience should at any time prove that the judicial and executive authority do not possess neans to insure adequate protection to constitutional rights in a Territory, and if the Territorial government should fail or reduce to provide the necessary remedies for that purpose, it will be the duty of Cougness to supply such de Reiesey.

This resolution, it will be observed, does not

Resolved. That the inhabitants of a Territory of the United States, when they rightfully forms constitution to be admitted as a State, may then, for the first time, like the people of a State when forming a now constitution, declde for themselves whether slavory as a domestic institution, shall be maintained or prohibited within their priviledicins, and that they shall be received into the Union with or without slavery, as their constitution may prescribe at the time of their admission.

If Mr. Davis had said "citizens" of a Territory, instead of "inhabitants." it would have been much better. We are unwilling to believe that Mr. Davis sanctions the doorrine that unnaturalized

ings necessary in the conversion of a Territory into a State.

An amendment offered by Wilson, to the effect that it was the duity of Congress to prevent the extension of slavery into the Territories, was defeated by a vote of nine to thirty-three. The Black Republicans seem to have avoided an expression of opinion on this point, though it has always been a leading feature of their platform.

On the whole, Mr. Davis' series of resolutions seem to have been generally adopted. Whether this is to be considered an authoritative platform for the Convention at Baltimore remains to be seen. The Douglas men say not. They claim that the platform is to remain as it was adopted at Charleston. But there are alroady signs of giving away among the Northern Democracy-and it is reported that the New York delegates will make a away among the Northern Democracy and it is reported that the New York delegates will make a clean surrender.
