Mr. Editor:—Our Sugar market is exceedingly dull. Chief cause—the want of suitable descriptions to fill orders.

The stock here and at Matanzas is greatly reduced, and does not exceed 60,000 boxes at both ports. The quotations of our largest houses are upon the basis of 84 to 84 1/2 cents per arroba for E. S. No. 12.

MOHAWK—None at this market. LARKS—The rates for this article are slowly improving. Barrels and barrels sell at \$10, and kegs at \$18 per quintal. Stock of bbls. and barrels, moderate; of kegs, very large.

Butter—10 kegs superior Goshen, from New York, realized on the 4th inst. \$30 per quintal, and 40 kegs, also from New York, (Galatini) \$19 per quintal.

Onions—No sales reported since last advice. HAMS—1 hhd. and 10 boxes ex Quebec City, from New York, realized on the 2d inst. \$17 1/2 per quintal, and 12 hds. also from New York, realized on the 4th at the same rate. The article is abundant.

YELLOW FINE—Secare. A cargo from Wilmington realized \$35, and one from St. Mary's \$34 per M.

COGNAC—(Except Hopp) dull. HOPS—Wanted. Long (shaved) at \$65, and short at \$45 per M.

FRUITS—Condition extremely dull. Nothing doing in United States. To Europe 40 to 45c. is accepted by some Spanish cargo.

ECHEANES—Languid. I quote Sterling at 14 to 15 per cent. premium. New Orleans (short) at 7 to 10 per cent. premium. New York (60 day bills) at 8 to 10 per cent. premium.

HAVANA, Dec 7, 1860.
