THE LOUISIANA STATE CONVENTION.

WEDNESDAY, Feb. 6, 1862.—The Convention was called to order at quarter 12. Prayer was offered by the Rev. Mr. Walker, of the Methodist Church.

The roll being called, 56 members answered to their names. The journal was read and approved, and a resolution of thanks in it, on the motion of Mr. Manning and Mr. Walker.
